WHY I LOVE VISTA

I've used Vista ever since it came out over 2 years ago, and I tell you it is the most fantastic operating system yet.

1. Search Boxes;

Click on Start and you'll see a Start Search box at the bottom left. Type in Word and Microsoft Word comes up in the column above. Type in movie and Windows Movie Maker comes up. Type in an unusual word from a email and it will bring up the email. Then left click on what comes up and it opens the program or email, it is like a miracle



2. Windows Photo Gallery:

Click on a picture and you have all kinds of options.

Fix, Print, Email, Burn, make a movie, etc.

Click tab Fix, you may select, Adjust Color, Crop Picture, Fix Red Eye, etc. This is a great feature, you don't have to open a photo program to make changes it is built right in to Vista.

Click on VIEWS and you will find a slider to enlarge your thumbnails or click on Extra Large Icons. It's great. When you are fixing Red Eye it is better to increase the size of the photo and then do the Red Eye fix.

3. Let's go Snipping:

Start, Programs, Accessories, Snipping Tool.

Or Type Snip in the Start Search. You can capture any part of the screen. I used the Snipping Tool on the screen to obtain this picture.

WHAT EVERY MAC USER SHOULD KNOW

If you use a Mac, you know there are plenty of keyboard commands, hidden features, and other goodies that are available if you know how to access them.



Here's a quick overview of some features of which you might not be aware:

1. Turn any page into a .pdf (Adobe Portable Document File)

Say you want to save a Web page to view later. One quick way to do this is by using the Print command. Then click on the button labeled PDF, then Save as PDF. This is one quick way to email a Web page, save documents for future reading, or retain quickly changing data (such as a Web page that's constantly updated).

2. Flash drives work with multiple formats

Most flash drives (sometimes called Travel drives or other names) automatically work with Macs and Windows. When you install a flash drive in a Mac, it automatically appears on the Desktop. when you're done using the flash drive, drag it to the Trash (the Trash becomes an ejector). The drive will disappear from the Desktop. Then you can remove it from the Desktop. You can use Disk Utility to reformat any flash drive so it works only on the Mac, only on Windows, or on both formats.

3. Customize your Dock

Mac users should place their most-used programs on the Dock, the bar that runs on the bottom of the Mac OS X screen (or on the side of the screen if the user changes the setting). If a program icon is accidentally removed from the Dock, simply drag the icon out of the Applications folder and back to the Dock.

4. I can't empty my Trash

One of the files in the Trash may be locked. Try holding down the Option key on your keyboard and empty the Trash. See if that does it.

5. Alternatives to Microsoft Office

Many folks don't realize that NeoOffice and Star Office are very good free alternatives to Microsoft Office for Mac. Both programs allow you to create and open Word, Excel and PowerPoint files.

6. I need the date.

Simply click on the clock in the upper right-hand side of your screen. The date will be shown below the time.

7. Right-click

If your mouse has two buttons, simply click on the right button to right-click. If you have a one-button mouse, hold down the Control key on your keyboard and then click your mouse. Right-clicking on a Mac provides a small contextual menu that offers a quick way to access options.

8. Copy a file or folder

Hold down the Option key and drag the file or folder to its destination. That's the easy way to copy a document.

9. Wireless keyboards and mice



10. Mac OS X

The Mac operating system is pronounced "10" not "x." So the next time you see OS X, remember the X is a number, not a letter.
