Annual Picnic includes the annual CKCS election Monday, June 10, at 6:00 pm


CKCS Annual Picnic will be held June 10th at Shillito Park, Shelter #5. During this picnic two important things will occur:


Vice President

He then works to get them in working order by installing the appropriate operating system, security software, Open Office and insuring that all the components work together. These are then donated to KRM for clients and their children who are arriving in America.

Recently this endeavor was enhanced by Freddy Peralta at Ky Trade Computer Services who donated 10 computers to KRM in CKCS's name. Monitors were also needed and these have been provided by Ky Trade and donations through CKCS.

If you would like to be a part of this joint community service and have equipment to donate, Charlie is accepting computers that are less than 10 years old with Windows XP or later versions. Monitors should be at least VGA. For keyboards and mice, it would be nice if they have scroll wheels. Laptops are also welcome. Please don't bring in older equipment as someone in the office will just have to take it to the recycle center. You might call or e-mail before you bring something into the office to see if it is needed. Since Charlie has limited space, he can only handle so much equipment at one time.

Do you use INSIGHTBB for your Email? Now what?

What is going to happen as Time Warner takes over from Insight?

Many CKCS members and their friends and family are Insight Communications customers for Internet service, cable television and/or landline telephone service.

Insight has been bought by Time Warner – a much larger company with many more customers. You are probably aware that the corporate name changing has already started. Service trucks are being repainted and advertising is beginning to show the new name.

But what is going to happen with your services?

First, you will begin paying bills to a new company. But, you don't have to change immediately – they will still accept payments to Insight for several months. If you use a bank billpay system, you will have to see that the payee's name and other details gets changed from Insight to Time Warner. It is possible that your bank will do this for you, but it is still up to you to verify that it is correct.

Second, the phone numbers you call for various services may change but the old numbers will continue working for a while. Check to see when these will change.

Third, if you are an Internet customer, your email address will need to be changed. Actually you will need to create a completely new email address.

Time Warner wants you to set up an email account with them at twc.com but you may choose to go with Gmail or Yahoo or one of the “web-based” email services. This is your decision to make but the time is drawing near when you must decide something.

Of course, whatever you choose, you will need to notify all your friends and family about your new email address. (Don't worry, the spammers will figure this out on their own – you may even have peace and quiet for a few weeks until they find you.)

Time Warner has published that any email sent to your old address will be forwarded to your new address for one year. This might be the case only if you create a twc.com address – check to make sure.

Fourth, if you are an Insightbb Internet customer, will your Internet service change? Probably not, but this is a good time to figure out exactly what you are paying for and whether it is worth it. You may wish to make some changes. This likely will be an easy time to do it.



Fifth, if you are an Insight cable television customer there have been some statements that only minor changes are going to be made. Be careful and make sure you approve of any changes. Of course, Time Warner will be very helpful signing you up for more expensive services.

Sixth, if you are an Insight telephone customer your service will continue without interruption. Time Warner has stated that you will need to update any answering service options and messages. And there will be opportunities to add or remove other services.

Finally, your transition from Insight to Time Warner should not be difficult if you plan ahead and be ready to meet any deadlines by thinking about your choices beforehand.



Slate.com: Apple's Next Big Thing Is Not a Watch or TV

Writer Predicts iPad Will Surpass iPhone as Apple's Biggest Seller

“If this trend continues, the iPad will eclipse the iPhone as the company’s best-selling product by 2015, if not sooner. After that, our picture of Apple will change. It will be the world’s biggest tablet company, one that also dabbles in iPhones and Macs.” —Farhad Manjoo, Slate.com; April 24, 2013



For many decades, Apple has been synonymous with Macintosh.

Millions of Mac users, from Lexington to London and from Somerset to Sydney, boot up their computers daily to complete a variety of tasks. As I've mentioned before in this column, I use my Mac more than my car. That isn't about to change anytime soon.

To millions of others, the California company that brought us the Mac is synonymous with the iPhone. That smartphone is Apple's biggest seller and it can be found everywhere. The iPhone is not only Apple's hottest product. Slate.com says the iPhone is the *most profitable product in the world*.

Then where does Apple's fast-selling tablet fit into the picture?

The iPad is about to take center stage and will soon outsell every other Apple product says Slate.com's Farhad Manjoo: “In an earnings report released yesterday (April 23, 2013), Apple said that it sold 19 million iPads during the first three months of the year. That's an increase of 65 percent from the same quarter last year. By comparison, the company sold 37 million iPhones, about 7 percent more than the previous year.”

Manjoo predicts Apple's tablet computer will outsell every other Apple product in three short years, if not sooner.

How can he be so sure? Because, Manjoo says, Apple is following the path it used to sell the iPod. “In that business—unlike in the phone market—Apple began by creating a category-defining product and then constantly expanded its lineup to cover every price point and usage scenario: The original iPod was followed by the iPod Mini, the Nano, the Shuffle, and the Touch. Apple didn't make much money on some of those very cheap models, but it was willing to sacrifice profits because it had another trick up its sleeve: consumer lock-in. Because you stored your music in—and even purchased it from—iTunes, once you entered the iPod ecosystem, you had little incentive to leave...”

So what about the iPad? “It's the same story with the iPad,” claims Manjoo.

“Over the last three years, Apple diversified its tablet lineup: The company now sells a 9.7-inch high-definition tablet for \$499, a non-high-def 9.7-inch model for \$399, and the \$329 iPad Mini. Yes, that's still not dirt cheap—you can buy one of Amazon's Kindle tablets for \$159, and Google's Nexus 7 sells for \$199. Indeed, the iPad's sales do seem to have been hit by these very cheap rivals. According to

the research firm IDC, Apple claimed 44 percent of the tablet market in the last quarter of 2012, down from 52 percent during the same time in 2011. IDC predicts that in 2013, Apple will account for 46 percent of the tablet market, while a slew of cheap Android tablets will account for 48 percent of sales.” Okay. Fair enough.

The story is much deeper than this, the Slate.com writer says. Focus on *profits*.

“But it’s important to note that those rivals are selling their devices at cost—neither Amazon nor Google makes any profit on sub-\$200 tablets. This is a testament to the iPad’s imperviousness to competition: The iPad’s year-over-year sales surged by 65 percent—and its market share dipped only slightly—when it was pitted against rivals that weren’t making any money on their devices.”

Then Manjoo asks why are people willing to spend \$329 on an iPad when they can get an Android tablet for \$200?

He says it’s not because the iPad is more attractive or powerful.

“The iPad is more useful—because its App Store is packed with an order of magnitude more apps than you’ll find for any other tablet.”

According to Manjoo, Apple says it has 350,000 apps in its App Store made explicitly for the iPad. In contrast, Manjoo says, “Google has never disclosed the number of tablet-specific Android apps, but anyone who’s ever perused the Play store knows the number is tiny. This is a crucial advantage, because unlike for a phone, a tablet is pretty useless without great apps.”

By introducing the less expensive iPad Mini, the Slate.com writer says, “Apple has lowered its overall profitability, one of the factors dragging down its stock price. But, as in the iPod business, the short-term profit loss will help solidify long-term dominance. Here is the lock-in story again: Apple is certain that people who jump on the iPad bandwagon today will stick with it for life. Even if your iPad Mini purchase doesn’t help Apple’s bottom line very much, you’ll buy lots and lots of apps for your device. Then, when the time comes to buy a new tablet, you’ll have little incentive to switch to Android and have to buy all new apps.”

He concludes, “It’s very likely that Apple’s next big thing is already out there. The iPad is going to be huge. Just watch.”

No Mac/iPad SIG Meetings in June or July

Apple Expected To Release New OS X and iOS Versions in June

June should be a very busy month for Apple as the company is expected to release new versions of the operating system running on its Macs (OS X) as well as the operating system running on its iPhones, iPads, and iPod touches (iOS).

The June Computer Mystery Workshop will cover two topics

The next episode of Computer Mystery Workshop will be on Wednesday, June 5, at 1:30 p.m.

Workshop leader Bob Brown says **the first topic will be Google Glass.**

You probably have seen or heard about Google Glass, a pair of glasses with a computer display added. This is an experimental product that is now being tested by specially invited people around the world. Google has announced that a consumer product will be available in 2014.

Google Glass has an approximately ½ inch square display mounted just above the right eye and about an inch in front. You can look at the display by just lifting your gaze upward a small amount. If you are walking down a street, you can use Google maps to determine where you are and which turns to make. You can take photos with voice commands and send the photos to your Internet photo storage site.

It is assumed that there will be many more “apps” created that enhance the use of the glasses in many unexpected ways.

During this workshop, we will look at the specifications for the product, watch some videos of people who have used them and speculate on what may be coming.

The second topic will be Pro XPN. This is a service that allows you to browse the Internet privately with no one able to monitor your data or know your location.

Pro XPN provides a software package for your computer which helps you do Internet browsing through an encrypted connection to a server that then retrieves desired Internet pages and sends them back to your computer. This prevents spy software or other listeners from seeing your data packets to or from your computer and they cannot get your IP address which can be translated to your location.

We will look at this service which has a free version and several levels of pay service.

Also, we will have time for discussions and speculation about the future of these and other products.

Bring your laptop if you wish to follow along.

A four-member Best Buy team visited CKCS last month





She also brought a Sony NEX5 camera with interchangeable lenses with several from which to choose. Both cameras are capable of 16 Megapixels exposures.




On CKCS Tech Night in May, **Markus McDonnell**

demonstrated the new Microsoft Surface Pro computer, which has an excellent battery life between charging; 8 hours of constant use or 2-3 days in a standby mode. The surface unit has an onscreen keyboard but one model has an attachable keyboard pad. A



standard keyboard is available for both models. The Surface unit is about 3 pounds heavier than an apple iPad, but it is a full-fledged computer and a substitute for the laptop. Two models are offered. The Surface RT has 2GB ram and 32 or 64 GB storage. The Pro version comes with 4 GB of Ram and 64 or 128 GB or storage. Both models use the Windows 8 operating system and the RT model, which costs less, comes with the latest Microsoft Office program installed as part of the purchase price. For many people this will be a substitute for the laptop only with portability that makes it more convenient to use.

Best Buy's **James Lovato** talked about several smart phones including the latest Samsung Galaxy Android phone he holds in this photo. James also displayed a "Broadband card" sometimes called a mobile hotspot (not shown) which, with a subscription through your phone service provider, can give the owner wireless Internet access wherever they go, even while on the road.

Fifty interesting facts about the human body

The human body is a treasure trove of mysteries, one that still confounds doctors and scientists about the details of its working. It's not an overstatement to say that every part of your body is a miracle. Here are fifty facts about your body, some of which will leave you stunned... or...


1. It's possible for your body to survive without a surprisingly large fraction of its internal organs. Even if you lose your stomach, your spleen, 75% of your liver, 80% of your intestines, one kidney, one lung, and virtually every organ from your pelvic and groin area, you wouldn't be very healthy, but you would live.
2. During your lifetime, you will produce enough saliva to fill two swimming pools. Actually, saliva is more important than you realize. If your saliva cannot dissolve something, you cannot taste it.
3. The largest cell in the human body is the female egg and the smallest is the male sperm. The egg is actually the only cell in the body that is visible by the naked eye.



4. The strongest muscle in the human body is the tongue and the hardest bone is the jawbone.
5. Human feet have 52 bones, accounting for one quarter of all the human body's bones.
6. Feet have 500,000 sweat glands and can produce more than a pint of sweat a day.
7. The acid in your stomach is strong enough to dissolve razor blades. The reason it doesn't eat away at your stomach is that the cells of your stomach wall renew themselves so frequently that you get a new stomach lining every three to four days.
8. The human lungs contain approximately 2,400 kilometers (1,500 mi) of airways and 300 to 500 million hollow cavities, having a total surface area of about 70 square meters, roughly the same area as one side of a tennis court. Furthermore, if all of the capillaries that surround the lung cavities were unwound and laid end to end, they would extend for about 992 kilometers. Also, your left lung is smaller than your right lung to make room for your heart.
9. Sneezes regularly exceed 100 mph, while coughs clock in at about 60 mph.
10. Your body gives off enough heat in 30 minutes to bring half a gallon of water to a boil.
11. Your body has enough iron in it to make a nail three inches long.
12. Earwax production is necessary for good ear health. It protects the delicate inner ear from bacteria, fungus, dirt and even insects. It also cleans and lubricates the ear canal.
13. Everyone has a unique smell, except for identical twins, who smell the same.
14. Your teeth start growing six months before you are born. This is why one out of every 2,000 newborn infants has a tooth when they are born.
15. A baby's head is one-quarter of its total length, but by the age of 25 will only be one-eighth of its total length. This is because people's heads grow at a much slower rate than the rest of their bodies.
16. Babies are born with 300 bones, but by adulthood the number is reduced to 206. Some of the bones, like skull bones, get fused into each other, bringing down the total number.
17. It's not possible to tickle yourself. This is because when you attempt to tickle yourself you are totally aware of the exact time and manner in which the tickling will occur, unlike when someone else tickles you.
18. Less than one third of the human race has 20-20 vision. This means that two out of three people cannot see perfectly.
19. Your nose can remember 50,000 different scents. But if you are a woman, you are a better smeller than men, and will remain a better smeller throughout your life.
20. The human body is estimated to have 60,000 miles of blood vessels.



21. The three things pregnant women dream most of during their first trimester are frogs, worms and potted plants. Scientists have no idea why this is so, but attribute it to the growing imbalance of hormones in the body during pregnancy.
22. The life span of a human hair is three to seven years on average. Every day the average person loses 60-100 strands of hair. But don't worry, you must lose over 50% of your scalp hairs before it is apparent to anyone.
23. The human brain cell can hold five times as much information as an encyclopedia. Your brain uses 20% of the oxygen that enters your bloodstream, and is itself made up of 80% water. Though it interprets pain signals from the rest of the body, the brain itself cannot feel pain.
24. The tooth is the only part of the human body that can't repair itself.
25. Your eyes are always the same size from birth but your nose and ears never stop growing.
26. By 60 years of age, 60% of men and 40% of women will snore.
27. We are about 1 cm taller in the morning than in the evening, because during normal activities during the day, the cartilage in our knees and other areas slowly compress.
28. The brain operates on the same amount of power as 10-watt light bulb, even while you are sleeping. In fact, the brain is much more active at night than during the day.
29. Nerve impulses to and from the brain travel as fast as 170 miles per hour. Neurons continue to grow throughout human life. Information travels at different speeds within different types of neurons.
30. It is a fact that people who dream more often and more vividly, on an average have a higher Intelligence Quotient.
31. The fastest growing nail is on the middle finger.
32. Facial hair grows faster than any other hair on the body. This is true for men as well as women.
33. There are as many hairs per square inch on your body as a chimpanzee.
34. A human fetus acquires fingerprints at the age of three months.
35. By the age of 60, most people will have lost about half their taste buds.

42. It takes 17 muscles to smile and 43 to frown.
43. Humans can make do longer without food than sleep. Provided there is water, the average human could survive a month to two months without food depending on their body fat and other factors. Sleep deprived people, however, start experiencing radical personality and psychological changes after only a few sleepless days. The longest recorded time anyone has ever gone without sleep is 11 days, at the end of which the experimenter was awake, but stumbled over words, hallucinated and frequently forgot what he was doing.
44. The most common blood type in the world is Type O. The rarest blood type, A-H or Bombay blood, due to the location of its discovery, has been found in less than hundred people since it was discovered.
45. Every human spent about half an hour after being conceived, as a single cell. Shortly afterward, the cells begin rapidly dividing and begin forming the components of a tiny embryo.
46. Right-handed people live, on average, nine years longer than left-handed people do. This is largely due to the fact that a majority of the machines and tools we use on a daily basis are designed for those who are right handed, making them somewhat dangerous for lefties to use and resulting in thousands of accidents and deaths each year.
47. Your ears secrete more earwax when you are afraid than when you aren't.
48. Koalas and primates are the only animals with unique fingerprints.

Survey: iPad Best Tablet When Measuring Customer Satisfaction

So Says 2013 U.S. Tablet Satisfaction Study by J.D. Power and Associates

If you don’t currently own a computer tablet, chances are good you might buy one. Which one should you buy?

A new study by J.D. Power and Associates can’t answer that question for you, but it shines the spotlight on tablet users’ opinions.

The 2013 U.S. Tablet Satisfaction Study quizzed 1,857 tablet owners in February of this year to learn how they felt about their tablets.

Based on a 1,000–point scale, here’s how various tablet manufacturers scored:

Apple: 836

Amazon: 829

Samsung: 822

Asus: 818

Acer: 784


It’s no secret that Apple’s iPad is the best–selling tablet computer. This study shows that many tablet owners also believe that, overall, the iPad is better than competing tablets.

Apple and Amazon were the only two tablet makers to score higher than the industry average score of 828. The study looked at tablet owners who have owned their tablet for a year or less. J.D. Power uses five key factors to evaluate satisfaction:

- Performance (the most important factor)
- Ease of operation
- Styling and design
- Features
- Cost

The study also examined the behavior of tablet owners. It revealed that:

- 51 percent share their device with at least one other person
- Sharing appears to be connected to greater overall tablet satisfaction
- Tablets beat out smartphones for viewing the Web; tablet owners who also have smartphones spend 36 percent more time Web browsing on tablets than their phones



Switching to the Mac—It’s Happening More Than You Know

Whether it’s because of displeasure with Microsoft’s latest operating system or because of the so-called “halo effect,” more computer users are making the switch to Mac.

In February, Sam Glover wrote in the *Lawyerist* blog, “After years of using Windows, I recently did what I regularly advise others to do: I bought a Mac. So far, it’s been great, and to my surprise, relatively painless. I have had to solve a few problems, but none particularly difficult.”



In 2011, Apple’s CFO Peter Oppenheimer said that 50% of consumers buying Macs at Apple retail stores are classified as “new to Mac.” Earlier, Apple has said that 40 percent of new Mac buyers were switchers—meaning they had switched from a Windows computer.

TidBits: Adobe Customers Not Pleased by Company’s Decisions

If you’re a long-time user of Adobe’s Photoshop or its other line of software products, you’ll want to read a recent TidBits article about Adobe’s decision to eliminate boxed software and replace it with subscriptions:



TidBits: Creative Cloud Complaints Darken Adobe's View of the Future —

The article makes several important points:

- Adobe is phasing out boxed copies of Creative Suite 6. TidBits points out that “the product itself will remain available for purchase and upgrade via electronic software distribution indefinitely, with bug fixes and security updates as necessary.”
- Creative Cloud may save you money when compared to buying a fresh full retail copy of Creative Suite 6, “it’s not such a great deal for those upgrading from nearly any previous version of the suite,” says TidBits.
- “Adobe could provide more to loyal customers than just a discount for a single year. In the past Adobe rewarded customer loyalty with “cheap” upgrades. You’d spend a small fortune on the initial purchase, but the subsequent upgrades would be only a fraction of that price. Now, it works in reverse: thanks to that first-year discount, Creative Cloud is “cheap” upfront, but will grow in cost over time,” according to TidBits.
- What about choice? Not so fast says TidBits. “Of course, loyalty discounts wouldn’t solve one of the main issues with Creative Cloud pricing: the \$19.99 per month (for a year commitment) pricing ensures you cannot pick and choose which apps you want.”
- TidBits puts its finger on what might be the single most problematic issue with Adobe’s decision: *“Regardless of costs, the other problem with Creative Cloud is that once you’ve hopped onto the Adobe train, there’s no getting off. Sure, you can cancel your subscription at any time, but as soon as you do, you lose the capability to edit – or even open – any of the files that exist in Adobe’s proprietary formats. You must keep paying if you want to open and work with your files, even if they are hosted on your local machine. If your files live in Adobe’s cloud, you’ll have 90 days to download copies, and although your account won’t be deleted, it will drop to the 2 GB free level.”*

The article adds that Adobe could address this last problem in part by providing a free viewer for all of its proprietary formats such as Adobe offers Adobe Reader for free and Microsoft provides free viewers for its Office file formats. The app wouldn’t allow the user to edit the Adobe files, but at least he or she could look into his or her own files to view the actual contents.

Finally, Creative Cloud requires an Internet connection to validate a user’s subscription every 30 days. Suppose you have ongoing Internet problems where you live, or you spend part of the year in a Florida townhouse, which has dodgy Internet service. Or, suppose you cancel your home Internet service to save money and rely on the WiFi at McDonald’s, Panera Bread, or Starbucks.

Internet service in America is not anywhere near the top of the pack. There are spots in every state where Internet service is out of the price range of residents, or it’s not even available via satellite.

TidBits concludes, “Going subscription-only for a package like Creative Suite is a bold move. We doubt that Adobe would even be attempting such a transition if not for the hegemony it has built in the creative world over the years. When it comes to professional design and publishing, it’s Adobe or



nothing. But Creative Cloud is still a huge bet, one that could enable Adobe to rake in more money per user than ever before. Or perhaps users will revolt, paving the way for fresh competition in the creative space. More likely is the middle ground, where Adobe will continue to sell Creative Suite 6 packages quietly, while tweaking Creative Cloud's terms to assuage critics.

If you're among those critics, don't just vent in our comments, let Adobe know how you feel! There's a petition up at change.org with nearly 16,000 signatures as of this writing. Of course, it's also worth expressing your opinions directly, with the Adobe Creative Cloud forum and the Creative Cloud Twitter account being good places to start."

Study: Android's Malware and Piracy Problems are Growing

Smartphones running the Google Android operating system are facing ever-increasing problems with malware according to research by F-Secure Labs. The study reveals that the reason Android fares



poorly when it comes to malware is because *most users are running an outdated version of the operating system on their phones.*

Compare that to iOS and Windows phones, which are essentially threat-free. (iOS is the operating system running on Apple's iPhones and its iPad tablets.)

A Trojan Horse designed for Android called Steis, distributed fake emails, claiming to be from the Internal Revenue Service. The malware stole sensitive information from the phones and then made phone calls to premium numbers.

The malware problem on Android phones has reached a level "approaching the relative level of compromised Windows systems," according to F-secure research. Sean Sullivan, a security advisor at F-Secure, says, "I'll put it this way: Until now, I haven't worried about my mother with her Android because she's not into apps. Now I have reason to worry because with cases like Steis, Android malware is also being distributed via spam, and my mother checks her email from her phone."

Reports indicate that Google has improved security in newer versions of Android, but earlier versions of the operating system prior to v4 still dominate.

Report: Tablet Sales Surpass Combined Sales of Laptop and Desktop in U.K.

What's occurring "across the pond" in the United Kingdom, might be a good reflection of what's occurring right here in the U.S. It would appear predictions by the late Steve Jobs and current Apple CEO, Tim Cook, are "spot on" as the Brits would say.

Research firm IDC has just released a new study of computer buying habits in the United Kingdom. It reveals, for the first time, that shipments of computer tablets outpaced the combined shipment of both laptop and desktop computers in the first three months of this year. Both Jobs and Cook predicted that many consumers and businesses would eventually discover that they could perform most everyday computing duties by using lighter devices such as the iPad and Apple's Mac Air laptops.


In the U.K., IDC says a total of 2.8 million tablets were shipped in the first quarter, compared to 2.3 million PCs in the same period. That's an increase in tablet computer sales of 188 percent over the same period last year. IDC reports in the U.K., laptop sales fell 20 percent while sales of desktop machines dropped six percent.

IDC says the top three tablet sellers are Apple, Samsung and Amazon.

Pentagon Gives Thumbs Up To Use Apple Devices on its Network **Previously, Military Preferred Blackberry devices to protect sensitive data**

Bloomberg is reporting that military leaders at the Pentagon have given their approval to Apple devices running iOS 6 to connect to its secure network. Bloomberg says the decision may lead to a three-war battle for supremacy among Apple, Blackberry, and Samsung. In the past, the Pentagon has heavily relied on Blackberry devices.

The Defense Department, according to Bloomberg, has more than 600,000 mobile devices. That includes 470,000 Blackberrys, 41,000 Apple devices, and 8,700 products running Google's Android operating system.



The military has said it wants employees to be able to use commercial products on its networks. The military intends to create a military mobile apps store and hire an outside company to create a network that could allow as many as eight-million devices.

iPads Saving U.S. Air Force \$50 Million Over Ten Year Period

Ditching paper flight manuals is saving the U.S. Air Force huge amounts of money, according to news reports. The Street reports that the Air Force will buy 18,000 iPads to replace 90 pounds of paper per aircraft. The tablet will also replace the need for every crewmember to carry a 30-to-40 pound pile of paper manuals, according to Air Force Major Brian Moritz.

As The Street noted, “Apple iPads may be commonplace in homes and offices, but the popular tablet is now a key weapon in the U.S. Air Force’s battle for efficiency.”

The Street notes that weight savings varies among aircraft. iPads will cut 250 pounds from a four-person C17, and up to 490 pounds in a C-5 with a ten-person crew.

In a related item, American Airlines reported that it was able to save \$1 million in fuel costs by replacing paper manuals with iPads. In addition, the tablet has cut the number of pilots reporting back injuries from carrying heavy paper manuals.

Easily Share Files Between Your Devices With an App Called Instashare

Let’s say you’ve got a Pages word processing document that you desperately need to transfer from your Mac to your iPad. Here’s where an app called Instashare shines. It allows you to transfer a file from one iOS device to another or to a Mac.

Most folks email the file to themselves or use a cloud service such as Dropbox, SugarSync or iCloud. Another option is to file sync by hooking up your iPad, let’s say, using the USB cable to your Mac and iTunes. Or you might try using Apple’s Camera Connection Kit.

Instashare for iOS works like AirDrop for your mobile devices. It allows you to transfer files using WiFi or Bluetooth. Instashare for iOS is free but has ads. To remove those ads, you need to make an in app purchase of 99¢.

Instashare for OS X is currently in beta and allows you to send files to and from your Mac and your iOS devices. Instashare for OS X is free.



Access Files on Remote Computers and External Hard Drives

I regularly copy files to an external hard drive, which is connected to an Apple Airport Extreme Base Station. The Base Station provides WiFi Internet service so that I can connect iOS devices or laptop to the Internet.

But the hard drive is my central storage space. You might call it an electronic “closet,” where I store



all kinds of files.

Suppose that I want to copy a file from the external hard drive to the iPad. As you know, there's no way to physically connect the two. The iPad has no USB connector.

This is where an iOS app called FileBrowser saves the day. It allows you to easily connect to that external hard drive and get to your files stored there.

A Tale of Missed Opportunities: Intel and the iPhone

Intel Didn't Jump At the Chance to Build Processors to Run Apple's iPhones

Look inside your Mac. If it's a fairly modern machine, you'll see that an Intel chip powers the computer. Look inside your iPhone and you won't find an Intel processor.

That's because Intel decided against making processors for one of the best-selling electronic gadgets of all time. Intel's former CEO, Paul Otellini, tells *The Atlantic* that Apple approached his company when Apple was in the early stages of developing the iPhone.

"We ended up not winning it or passing on it, depending on how you want to view it. And the world would have been a lot different if we'd done it," Otellini told *The Atlantic* in a story published May 16. "The thing you have to remember is that this was before the iPhone was introduced and no one knew what the iPhone would do."

Otellini says Apple wanted a specific chip to run its phones and Apple management told Intel that it would only pay a certain price for it and nothing more. The price was below Intel's cost and Otellini says he couldn't see his company recouping its costs in volume sales so Intel rejected the proposal.

In hindsight, Otellini says, the forecasted cost of the chip was incorrect and the volume was 100x what anyone had predicted.

Most mobile devices, including Apple's iPhone, are powered by ARM, and are made by Apple, Samsung, Qualcomm and Nvidia. Intel is rapidly improving its low-power x86-based Atom chip. Some smartphones are using Intel's chip, but those are primarily sold overseas.

About the missed opportunity, Otellini told *The Atlantic*: ""The lesson I took away from that was, while we like to speak with data around here, so many times in my career I've ended up making decisions with my gut, and I should have followed my gut," Otellini said. "My gut told me to say yes."

'Crazy Ants' Invading Texas, Ruining Electronics



It reads like a bizarre script from one of Hollywood's "B" movies, but it's no movie script. A team of researchers from the University of Texas at Austin has confirmed that America's fire ant population is being pushed away by 'crazy ants' that love the interior of electronic devices, including computers.

These so-called 'Raspberry Crazy Ants' are able to live in just about any container and as they move, they interfere with other ant populations.

The Chron, the online version of the *Houston Chronicle*, quotes UT research assistant Edward Lebrun: "They nest in electronics and create short circuits, as they create a contact bridge between two points when they get electrocuted they release an alarm pheromone. The other ants are attracted to the chemicals that other ants give off," he says. Then, he adds, an even larger nest is created when more ants arrive.

Pest control worker Tom Raspberry first discovered the ants in 2002. Therefore, the ants were initially called 'Raspberry Crazy Ants' after him.

Lebrun told the Chron that there's not much you can do if you spot the ants except call pest control. The 'crazy ants' don't eat poison bait and no other ant population currently keeps the 'crazy ants' in check. The ant's scientific name is *Nylanderia fulva*.
