My recommendations for your new Windows 10 Computer

(The speed of your new computer is going to be a lot faster than your old one.)

Processor: Latest generation Intel core i3, i5, i7 processor or AMD equivalent. i5 and i7 are faster.

Memory: 8GB DDR4 or DDR3.

DDR4 is faster and operates at a lower voltage than DDR3.
Very High Speeds, 2800 vs 1600. 1.2 volts vs 1.5.

Ports: Should have both USB3 and USB2 Ports (USB3 is 10 times faster than USB2).
Then you need a USB 3.0 THUMB DRIVE. (Instead of 30 minutes it takes 3 minutes.)

Hard Drive: 256GB or 500GB Solid-State Hard Drive: they give you lightning speed. You gotta have this. OR


SSD Solid-State Hard Drives (SSD)

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Computer tips In about 100 words

COMPUTER TIP: Working with multiple applications

I often have several applications open on my desktop at any given time and need to move between the applications. The easiest way to do this is to click on ALT + TAB through the different applications.

You can similarly click through tabs on your internet browser by holding the Ctrl (control) key and click TAB repeatedly to move through the different sites that you might have open.

COMPUTER TIP: Quit watching TV all the time

Most all of us have heard of TED TALKS. If not, you are among the few. TT are 18 minute presentations that are presented by volunteers with something important to say. There is much competition to make a TT. They are fascinating talks and all worth your time. TT has been at it for 32 years. Search for: [Youtube.com/ted](https://www.youtube.com/ted) . The top 20 presentations are up front. Start at the top and work your way down. Not all at once – it would take six hours. Listen to a couple at a time – guaranteed better than any TV sitcom you might choose to watch.

COMPUTER TIP: Don't use the disc that comes with your new printer

If you purchase a printer or any product of that type that comes with a program disc, don't use the program disc. That disc may well be old and out of date. It may have been in that box with the product you bought for a year or more. Most companies frequently update the programs and drivers for the products they manufacture to correct problems and/or improve performance. The correct thing to do is go to the [official company website](#) and download the latest program or driver for your product you bought. So skip the disc. Get the latest program or driver from the company website. If you have the printer or device connected to your computer, sometimes the company websites can determine all they need to provide you the latest download, but if they can't they may need you to type a model number and what Windows version you are using.

Apple introduces new MacBook Pro laptops but no new desktops

“After watching yesterday’s Apple Event and reading around a bit at the reactions, I’ve become concerned for the future of the Mac, at least in the hands of the current leadership at Apple.”

“The Macintosh faithful are really getting antsy...My advice: If your Mac is long in the tooth, wait till mid-March before replacing it. Maybe we’ll see new models worth the cost and peripheral upgrades by then, maybe we’ll see the same models we have now with faster processors and more RAM, or maybe we’ll see nothing (in which case, get the most-maxed-out Mac you can afford.)”

As you read this, the future of Apple’s popular Macintosh *desktop* computers is cloudy.

Long-time Mac user and author Ted Landau writes, “The most lingering feeling I have from Apple’s media event yesterday is one of sadness. I felt I was witnessing the passing of an era. I have owned a desktop Mac since 1984. They continue to be my preferred workhorse computer. Unfortunately, the way things are headed, they may not be around the next time I am in the market to buy a new Mac.”

“Rather astounding how much backlash last week’s event has generated. I can’t recall an Apple event that generated such a negative reaction from hard-core Mac users,” writes John Gruber of the Daring Fireball blog.

Readers of this column are aware that Apple held a special event at its California campus shortly before Halloween to make a Mac announcement.



Many Apple watchers believed that Apple was prepared to announce a slew of new Mac models, replacing its dated desktop models such as the Mac mini and Mac Pro which have not been updated in years.

Instead, Apple announced a series of new MacBook Pro laptop models.

As MacRumors writes, "...The biggest addition to the MacBook Pro is the new "Touch Bar," which sits atop the keyboard and officially replaces the function keys on the laptop. As was rumored, Touch Bar is application specific and adapts to to what's on screen..."

Apple's failure to announce new desktop Macs during that October event does not bode well for the future of Macintosh desktop machines writes Landau: "Apple's desktop Mac lineup is headed for the graveyard. Dead. Done. Over. Why do I believe this? Because of the unstated implication of what Apple announced (and didn't announce) at its media event yesterday. Let's start with the big one: No new or updated desktop Macs were announced yesterday. This means that no new Mac models have been or will be released for the entire year 2016.



That's a significant omen all by itself. But it gets worse..."

Landau predicts the demise of each Mac desktop model in his "[Slanted Viewpoint](#)" blog:

- **iMac:** He believes Apple's most popular desktop Mac will be updated in 2017. "Beyond that, I am skeptical that we will ever again see a significant update to the iMac. It will linger on in Apple's catalog for several more years, but will receive scant attention. Eventually it will disappear – as laptops take over the entire Mac lineup."
- **Mac mini and Mac Pro:** He labels these models Apple's "Dead Macs Walking." He adds, "Apple still sells them, but I find it hard to believe Apple expects anyone to buy one. I fully expect they will be gone by the end of 2017." Landau mentions that the Mac mini was last

There are evil people out there with a full time goal to steal your money

A good friend received an email which I reproduced below. He called me for advice after he spent over an hour on the phone after he called the number shown. This email was addressed to eight people. I am only showing three addresses plus I have printed x's over those email addresses to obscure their identity. My friend's address is not one of the three shown. Look over the image, the message and the emails. Study it – then read my comments below:



This was an unsolicited email that just showed up, addressed to eight individuals.

Up front, let me say you should never respond directly to an unsolicited email talking about problems on your computer. Here are some of my thoughts about signs you should spot causing you to ignore a notice of this type;

- (1) I would doubt if Microsoft would be concerned about hackers on your computer enough so as to write you about it. Recent tech-night speakers from the Lexington MS store said they (MS) don't call you about problems. MS regularly fixes problems they find by sending frequent updates to their programs and in fact, they install them automatically without advance notice now-a-days.
- (2) Note that the sender's address is using a Gmail account. Wouldn't it be strange for MS to use a Gmail account since they own Outlook, hotmail and Windows live mail?
- (3) Googles tells me area code 631 is a segment in NY city – not that it is not impossible but MS does happen to be based in Seattle. That would make me wonder.

Those that responded to the ad were given reason to believe their computer had been hacked. , My friend was shown lists of several dozen sights that supposedly hacked into his computer to obtain passwords and bank account information. The long lists of hackers displayed on his screen included some from Russia – I wonder what made them add Russia to that group? My friend actually allowed them to access and take control of his computer – that was a big mistake since he really did not know who to whom he was talking. The lady at the ‘support site’ offered to clean his computer and make sure spying programs that had been added were removed and they would protect his computer for a year for several hundred dollars. He told me they offered several different fees some at a slightly reduced price.

My advice to my friend, if you think you are being scammed, simply hang up, and immediately turn off your computer and disconnect it from the internet. Had my friend called just before a Dr. Fixit day at CKCS, I would have suggested he go there and get help from our experts. Since his call was just after that first Saturday of each month, I suggested he take his computer to our corporate sponsor, Kentucky Trade, and get help from them to clean up his computer and scan for viruses in case there might be some.

Also, NEVER give personal information about yourself, your family, your work, your bank to anyone that you didn’t personally call or contact yourself. Don’t call a number someone provides you to call with any of your information. If you wish to order something online, you get the number from the website; however, you must be sure it is the company’s official website. If you are not sure, don’t guess, just don’t do it. NEVER agree to let someone you don’t know access your computer unless you contacted a company support site asking for their help and you trust them.



What if I die first?


My wife has days when she wants us to "talk about things." We were discussing aspects of our future so when it was my turn I asked her: "What will you do if I die before you do?"

- » **Make sure that you are visiting the website that you really want to visit;** there are many misleading sites that try to trick you into believing that they are the intended legit site ... but they are not! Be careful with the spelling of the name of a site; be careful with the first "findings" of the search engines; most times they are no findings but (many times deceptive) advertising.
- » If somebody call you about the "problems of your computer" **simply hang off;** they are not legitimate people so do not even waste your time even threatening them.

updated in 2014. “Overall, it’s a decent machine but Apple appears to have abandoned it.” Regarding the sleek looking Mac Pro manufactured in Austin, Texas: “The current state of the Mac Pro is an even sadder story. It was released in 2013 and has never been updated! I see no sign that Apple ever intends to do so.” He adds that Apple never invested the time and resources to make the Mac Pro a greater success. He assumes that Apple “concluded that the market for a desktop pro-level Mac was either no longer there or no longer worth pursuing.” He concludes, “Apple sees its future tied to portable and mobile devices. In other words, the future of the Mac is laptops – which doesn’t leave room for the Mac Pro.”

Mac desktops aren’t the only computers that aren’t seeing upgrades. Galen Gruman writes in his Infoworld column: “PCs haven’t changed in years, either. Other than the usual performance upgrades, a PC today is no different than a PC of 2012. The big change since then in the PC world has been the so-called 2-in-1/hybrid/PC tablet, epitomized by the Microsoft Surface Pro. Ironically, none of these devices is about new technology, but being more like an iPad while still being a laptop. So, any PC envy is misplaced. A PC is still a PC.”



During Apple’s late October event, the company did *not* announce a new standalone display to replace its Thunderbolt Display monitor.



Instead, it announced that electronics maker LG has created the [UltraFine 5K display](#) that connects to the newly announced MacBook Pro laptop. In addition, Apple killed off its least expensive laptop, the 11.6-inch MacBook Air.

Apple is a smart company. That makes me wonder why company leaders failed to mention the future of its desktop Mac line-up during the October event.

Was this an intentional “goodbye” to the desktop Mac?

By failing to mention any upgrades or new introductions of Mac desktop machines at a “major” Mac event, why didn’t company officials predict harsh reactions from many Mac users? Michael Tsai (whom I first discovered when I bought his popular SpamSieve email plug-in several years ago) writes that he is really disappointed by Apple’s October event. His remarks in his blog titled, [“New MacBook Pros and the State of the Mac”](#) are followed by dozens of comments from readers weighing in on Apple and the Mac.

That said, MacRumors is reporting that the just-announced MacBook Pro laptop is very, very popular.

In fact, Apple’s marketing chief Phil Schiller [tells](#) *The Independent* newspaper (based in London) that Apple has received more online orders for the new MacBook Pro than any other MacBook Pro in Apple’s history.

About all of this, Andrew Cunningham of the tech web site, [ars technica](#), [writes](#): “You can’t fault longtime die-hard Mac users for being a little frustrated with Apple. In the space of just a decade, they’ve watched their favorite platform go from being the center of the company’s attention to a minor line item. The iPhone gets refreshed promptly and consistently every September, while some Macs sit there for one or two or three years without even being



mentioned. Macs aren't even regularly refreshed with new processors from Intel, Nvidia, and AMD as they're released anymore..."

He adds, "If Apple had given some love to the desktop at the event last week, the reaction to the MacBook Pros probably wouldn't have been so harsh. What many of these users want is more, more processor, more graphics, more memory, and historically the best way to get more has been to get it from a desktop."

Cunningham says once Intel releases its new computer processors (called Kaby Lake), should Apple hold a desktop-centric presentation next spring, that would go a long way to reassure worried power users about Apple's desktop line-up.

Jason Snell, the former editorial director of Mac Publishing (which used to publish the paper version of the U.S. edition of Macworld) penned an article at macworld.com

headlined, [Why 2016 is such a terrible for the Mac](#). He writes, "There's a lot of unease out there among Mac users...Does Apple care about the Mac? I think it absolutely does, and that this year was a series of unfortunate events that made things seem worse than they are. But this is not to say that there aren't some serious issues with the Mac. If, in six months, we're still sitting here wondering what's up with the iMac and Mac Pro, it might be time to revisit this. But I

suspect than in six months Apple will have renewed most or all of the Mac product line (all powered by USB-C/Thunderbolt 3), and things will feel shiny and new again."

This begs the question – *what would the late Steve Jobs (who co-founded Apple Computer) say and do about all of this?*

Apple shuts down its wireless router division?


Apple Abandons Development of Wireless Routers shouts a headline from Bloomberg Technology. The report says, “Apple Inc. has disbanded its division that develops wireless routers, another move to try to sharpen the company’s focus on consumer products that generate the bulk of its revenue, according to people familiar with the matter. Apple began shutting down the wireless router team over the past year, dispersing engineers to other product development groups, including the one handling the Apple TV, said the people, who asked not to be named because the decision hasn’t been publicly announced.”

As you know, Wi-Fi routers are essential to connect iPads, laptops and desktops, iPhones, and other devices without wires to the Internet.

Bloomberg notes that Apple currently sells three wireless routers: the Airport Extreme, Airport Express, and the Airport Time Capsule. That last item doubles as a wireless backup storage device for Macs while also providing a Wi-Fi signal to connect to the Internet.

I have used Apple’s Wi-Fi routers for years because they were very high quality and extremely easy to set up. Apple used an app called Airport Utility, rather than a Web page, to connect one of its Airport routers to Macs, iPads, iPhones, etc. This was a very easy set up compared to configuring, let’s say, a Netgear, Belkin, or other router which used a Web page to initially connect the device to a cable or DSL modem.

The next time I need to buy a new wireless router, I’ll probably opt for the top-rated model tested by the folks at The Wirecutter Web site. They like the TP-Link Archer C7 (version 2.) David Murphy writes, “This dual-band, three-stream 802.11ac (wireless-ac) router wasn’t the fastest on all of our tests, but it has an amazing range and delivers great

performance for its low price. It's an unbeatable value." As I write this, Amazon sells the unit for \$85.94.

The Wirecutter's second choice is the TP-Link TL-WDR3600, which sells for \$71 from Amazon. If you want to pay for more features, the third choice is the Netgear R6400. The article notes that this model supports Time Machine backups (which makes this model a good choice for Apple households.)

There's a bit of irony here. The Wirecutter's fourth choice is Apple's Airport Extreme ("the easiest router to set up in an all-Apple household, but its performance at longer ranges doesn't match that of our top pick...)

By the way, if you currently rent a modem from Time Warner Cable (taken over by Charter Communications earlier this year), you might want to buy a cable modem and save more than \$100 a year. The Wirecutter has chosen the Arris SURFboard SB6183 (which is actually a Motorola product) as its top cable modem.

If you live in Lexington and use Time Warner Cable (now Charter Communications) for Internet service, you can most likely upgrade your speed to 50 megabits per second without increasing the amount you pay for Internet service. (Visit the Web site www.speedtest.net to see your Internet speed – and remember your speed constantly changes depending upon a lot of factors – including whether one of your neighbors is involved in a heavy-duty computer game using plenty of Internet resources.

The standard Internet speed from TWC (Charter Communications) in Lexington is 15 megabits per second. Upgrading to a new cable modem (one that's approved by Time Warner Cable) will automatically increase your speed to 50 Mbps once you buy a new modem, install it, and call Time Warner to get it activated.

I recently bought a different Arris SURFboard model and increased my Internet speed without increasing my Internet bill.

I've mentioned several times in this column that two Web sites (which The New York Times recently purchased) are my "go-to" spots when I'm considering the purchase of a variety of products ranging from external hard drives to slow-cookers.

The Wirecutter and *The Sweethome* are great tools to use when doing research. I don't always agree with them but they provide information that allows me to do further research via the Internet. Their testing is top-notch. **CKCS**



Common Facebook Terms:

Notification:	You'll receive a notification in an email message and on your Home page whenever someone interacts with you on Facebook. For example, you'll be notified when someone adds you as a friend, likes or comments on something you've shared, or sends you a private message.
Status Update:	One of the most common things people share on Facebook are status updates—short, text-based posts that your friends can see and comment on. You can also post other things, like photos, videos, links, and more. Your friends will be able to see your posts on their News feeds, and the things you share will also be posted to your Timeline.
Share:	The most common choices are Public and Friends. Public allows everyone to see your posts while Friends allows only those on your Friends List. Other options include Only Me and Custom. Be aware that your post may not remain private if one of your friends chooses to Share the post on their own wall.
App Share:	Apps and Games that allow you to log in with your Facebook account may also ask for permission to access your account including your contact lists and profile. These programs will sometimes post information on your wall for you such as game progress or current music selections. You may change these permissions on the Security Page.
Friend:	You can add people you know as friends on Facebook. Your friends will see the things you share, such as status updates or photos. Friends will also be able to view your profile information and share things on your Timeline.
Friend Request:	When someone requests that you add them as a friend
Timeline:	Also known as your profile page, the Timeline is where you'll share information about yourself on Facebook. For example, it's where you'll post your profile picture, share basic information about yourself, and more. Whenever you share something on Facebook, it will appear on your Timeline, as well as your friends' News Feeds.
News feed:	The News feed is a stream of updates from your friends and any Facebook Pages you follow. This is where you'll probably spend most of your time on Facebook, since it's where you can view and comment on what's happening with all of your friends.
Tag:	Friends can tag you in photos and posts they share on Facebook. Posts you're tagged in will appear on your Timeline. You can tag several people in a photo and the same link will appear on each person's timeline. You can change your settings so that images you are tagged in will not appear be seen by anyone on your page until you approve the tag. Again, if a friend chooses to Share an image, it will no longer be private.
Like:	Whenever your friends share something on Facebook, you can choose to like the post. This is just a simple way of showing your friends that you enjoyed what they shared. You can also like the Facebook Page for certain businesses and organizations to receive updates about them in your News Feed.
Comment:	Whenever your friends share on Facebook, you can leave a comment about their posts.
Privacy Shortcuts:	Clicking the Security Icon  on the upper right of the menu bar will give you a quick access menu with 3 of the most commonly accessed Privacy Shortcuts. The "See More Settings" link on the bottom will take you to the main security page with more options.
