MetroNet Fiber is coming to Lexington

Are you frustrated with Spectrum for your TV, internet needs, and phone needs? Wish there were competition in the Lexington market? Well, there is! MetroNet Fiber construction is underway. They promise blazing-fast fiber internet, stunning fiber TV, and crystal-clear and reliable fiber phone.

Darrick Zucco, VP & general manager of Lexington Market, has a team that is working in the Lexington area to bring this service to businesses and residential customers. Two members of the Metro Net team will be at August Tech Night to explain what makes 100 percent fiber so special and the benefits of internet speeds up to a gigabit. They will also talk about the options for wireless set-top boxes, whole home HD/DVR to record up to six channels at once, and remote DVR to schedule recordings while away from home.

Tana Williamson, marketing coordinator, and Rob Bartley, direct sales manager, will walk us through from the beginning when Mayor Gray made the announcement in November 2017, to when MetroNet Fiber started construction in January, to the future plans. They will explain what all is involved in constructing their 100% fiber optic network.

This evening promises to be a very interesting and educational presentation about this new enterprise that promises to change the Lexington technology landscape. —

The way auto-reply works, once you set it up, any email that arrives to your email address, within seconds the sender gets the message you set up such as the one above.

I would hesitate to use this feature myself because I typically receive 50 to 75 emails from people I don't know providing me appointment reminders, people soliciting donations, or robo type calls from anywhere to let me know my warranty has expired on the car (which I sold two years ago) or they are doing me a favor to strangely tell me my credit card is in good order. The auto-reply such as the above will of course get to those who know you, but unfortunately it will alert those total strangers who call, that you are going to be gone for a month and maybe the house would be empty. I don't need to list the reasons that is not a good idea. That is certainly something you should think very carefully about before leaving such a message. I believe the auto-reply feature is ideal for office worker on a trip so one does not wonder why they don't get an answer or respond to a question in a timely manner.

Course/Workshop Descriptions

Classes

Introduction to Photoshop Elements for Windows PC...In this introductory course we will learn to use the tools of this program to do basic photo enhancements including quick fixes, cropping, cloning, spot healing, red eye removal, levels, and adding borders. We will also discuss photo considerations prior to printing, introduction to layers, converting images to black and white, enhancing and restoring old photos, adding text, using brushes, graphics, adjustment layers, templates, special features, filters, and creating a slide show.

Exploring the World of Photography*...Topics covered will include, white balance, DOF (depth of field), aperture, shutter speeds to blur motion and stop motion. We will show how to photograph close up with the lens you already have. We will demonstrate close up and micro photography techniques with other lenses. You will learn how to correctly use common filters (polarizers and ND - neutral density). We will introduce you to infrared photography with your camera using our filters.

Weeks 1,3, and 6 will be held in the classroom and weeks 2, 4, and 5 will be held on location. The locations are the Arboretum, Henry Clay's home and Jacobson Park. You should bring filters if you have them. Filters will be available for the class to use for those who do not have filters. Bring your camera with fully charged battery, memory card, thumb drive and your camera manual.

Is Windows 10 Driving you Crazy?...Learn how to navigate in Microsoft's newest operating system by changing the Windows 10 Start Screen to make it more user friendly. You will install several free programs and learn how to use them, including a free word processor that is as robust as Word. We will look at computer security and how to back up your computer in case a disaster should occur. Also, we will look at OneDrive, Microsoft's cloud storage system, and how to use it to share your pictures with friends and family

Flash Photography (\$30)*...Learn how to use your built-in flash, an external flash and a soft box to take better pictures. The first class will be instructional, the second class will be to review your work and provide corrective assistance. Bring your camera with fully charged battery, memory card, thumb drive, your camera manual, and a flash, if you have one.

Photo Stitching (\$30)*...Learn how to use your post processing program to stitch 2,3,4 or more photos together to make one panoramic photograph. The first class will teach you how to stitch the photos. We will be demonstrating using Adobe Elements and PhotoShop. The second class will be spent reviewing your work and providing technical assistance. Bring your camera with its battery fully charged, memory card, thumb drive and your camera manual.

Computer Basics for Windows 10...Learn the fundamentals of using a Windows 10 personal computer. Learn to use various aspects of the Microsoft Word Processing program, including manipulating text and inserting graphics into a document. Basic filing and basic file management are introduced. The final class of this course deals with the basics of email and use of the Internet.



Organizing Your Computer Files for Windows 10 (\$30)...This class will enable the student to understand how Windows 10 personal computer filing works, set up a plan for organizing files, move files from one storage device to another, use nifty time-savers in moving a large number of files at once and understand how to make and use folders. CKCS Computers will be used for Lessons 1 & 2. Each attendee should bring his/her own laptop or a flash drive containing personal files for Lesson 3. Each person will have a chance to practice on his/her own files before leaving the class. A flash drive is required for class.

Get More Out of Your Mac...You use your Mac computer every day, but you probably only use a fraction of the shortcuts and tips that are built into your Mac's operating system. This course will teach you basic tips and shortcuts to help you become more productive and get work done faster. These tips work with the latest Mac operating system versions including High Sierra, Sierra, and El Capitan. This six-week course will help you become more proficient in using your Mac. There are dozens of settings you can turn on or off, System Preferences that can be customized, and shortcuts that make using your Mac more enjoyable. Students need a basic knowledge of the Mac operating system and how to use a mouse, trackpad or trackball to utilize the screen commands

Workshops

Fixing Up your Photos (and Other Things) Using FastStone Digital Imaging (Windows PC only)...Do you want to fix up and work on your pictures without paying a lot of \$\$\$\$ on a digital imaging program? We'll look at FastStone. FastStone is an extensive digital imaging program that is free and does a wide variety of things. In this workshop, you will learn how to dress up your pictures, crop, brighten or darken, create contact sheets, create a slide show that can include music and lots more. We will show you how to download the program along with a great syllabus.

Secrets of Your iPhone*...Learn important (and hidden) functions of your iPhone. Learn how to download apps, move them, nest them and delete them. Learn how to get better photos with your phone, organize your pictures, and send them in text and emails. Texting messages and using Siri will also be covered. Participants should bring their iPhone and know (or bring) their Apple ID and password.

Posing Individuals and Groups*...Learn the correct way to take individual, couple, small and large group photos. Learning how to pose your subjects will make your pictures look professional.

Making a Photo Book using Shutterfly...In this workshop the attendees will learn how to prepare pictures for a photo book, how to transfer pictures to the Shutterfly workspace, and then organize the pictures from the front to the last page of the book. Finally, we will go through the steps to ordering the book and applying coupons to reduce the price. For this scenario, attendees will use pictures supplied by the instructor. We will be using a program called Shutterfly.

Understanding Facebook...Students will learn how to maintain a Facebook page on the Windows PC. The Profile page and Home page will be explained. How to find friends, make a



post, edit and respond to posts, prioritizing news feeds, checking privacy settings, unfriending and blocking friends, and deleting and deactivating your Facebook account are some of the features covered.

30 + Tips to Using the Internet*...Whether you are working on a word document, a digital image or other project, you probably will be using the internet to gather more information, capture images or find explanations on how to do something. We will be using Google Chrome to explore ways to find things on the internet and of how to exclude things from a search, to how to search for specific words or string of words. We will cover handy things like the snipping tool, using the internet as a dictionary, Thesaurus, calculator and lots more.

Secrets of Your iPad*...Learn key information about many pre-installed apps on your iPad. Learn some important functions in settings, how to arrange, nest, download and delete apps. Sending emails and texts will be covered. Taking better photos, making folders, and sending them will be demonstrated. Face-time will be included if time permits. Participants should bring their iPad updated with the latest operating system and know (or bring) their Apple ID and password.

* These classes or workshops meet in the main room and their class size is determined by the instructor. All other classes meet in the computer classroom and are limited to eight students.

Students may use their own portable computers if they have the appropriate software installed (this is at the discretion of the instructor). CKCS cannot provide copies of the proprietary software.

COSTS: All classes have a fee payable to CKCS of \$60.00 and Workshops have a fee of \$30.00, unless stated otherwise (see above).



Let's Talk Adobe with Chris Bryant

Most of you have heard about (and maybe use) **Adobe Photoshop**. An extension to Photoshop is **Adobe Illustrator**. Adobe Illustrator is graphic-driven software used primarily for creating vector graphics. Developed alongside with Adobe Photoshop as a companion product, Adobe Illustrator is used for creating logos, graphics, cartoons and fonts for the photo-realistic layouts of Adobe Photoshop.

Christopher Bryant is a local educator at Lafayette High School where he teaches classes tailored toward the graphic arts. He has obtained three degrees from the University of Kentucky which include his Bachelors in Arts and Arts Education as well as his Master in Education. Christopher has been an active artist in the digital community outside of teaching. Previously, he has showcased a variety of work throughout the community, photographed for various private clients, created album and poster art for local musicians, and is currently working with a well known toy designer.

Chris has been asked to share his knowledge about industry standard programs in an ever-changing digital work environment. His skill and knowledge of the Adobe programs have helped him as well as former students to compete with other modern designers. His goal for today is to share his knowledge of these advanced programs and break the stereotypes associated with their difficulty and complexity.







Microsoft Store visits CKCS

At July's Tech Night, on July 9, Josh Walker, the assistant manager of the Lexington store, showed the Microsoft Surface Book and demonstrated the Surface Pen. Several members of the audience had touch screens and were interested in the Microsoft Windows Ink software to make notes and sketches. He also showed how to make the Windows 10 screen look more like a Window 7 version and mentioned the Classic Shell that Mike Seiler has been teaching in his Windows 10 class at CKCS.

Josh wanted to emphasize that the Microsoft Store was a great resource to solve problems that you might be having with your windows computer. The Microsoft Store is a kiosk in the middle of Fayette Mall, but they have enough space where they can help with any problems. One CKCS member shared that she had recently become



very frustrated and took her desktop out to them and they were able to help. Josh wanted to encourage people to come to the store to get this help and for training.



Be careful with the spelling of the name of a site; be careful with the first "findings" of the search engines; most times they are no findings but (many times deceptive) advertising.
- » If somebody call you about the "problems of your computer" **simply hang off;** they are not legitimate people so do not even waste your time even threatening them.
