





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How to register online: CKCS Classes & Workshops



Visit the [CKCS store](http://www.ckcs.org) and click on either **Classes** or **Workshops** on the blue menu at the top of the page. Choose the course you want to take and check out on the secure website using your credit card or PayPal account. Here's the CKCS Store website: www.ckcs.org/store. Instructions on how to use the online store are on a link at ckcs.org. You can use any valid credit card or PayPal account to pay for your class, workshop, or CKCS membership fee. A PayPal account is *not* required to register and pay online.



Because of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, all CKCS classes and workshops are taught using the Zoom app.

If you don't have Zoom on your Windows 10 PC, Mac, iPad, iPhone or Android device, page 19 of this newsletter tells where you can download the latest Zoom versions.

Pages five and six contain the spring class and workshop schedules.

While visiting the CKCS store website, here are your options:

Membership – Join CKCS by clicking on the Membership link. Choose among these options:

After you make a membership choice, you'll be asked to enter the name you want to appear on your CKCS membership card. You can pay by credit card online.

Classes via Zoom – Register and pay online by credit card or PayPal. (Click on a link for a specific class to get more details about that class.) Students will receive a Zoom link via email for each class before the class begins. The link will be sent to the email address you provide when you register.

Workshops via Zoom – Register and pay for CKCS workshops by credit card or PayPal. (Click on a link for a specific workshop to get more details about that event.) Students will receive a Zoom link via email for each workshop before it

begins. The link will be sent to the email address you provide when you register.

Got photos? Check out Amazon Photos

If you are constantly running out of space in Apple's Photo app or getting frustrated by Google Photo's new storage limits, Amazon Photos might be your solution.

The tech website [Ars Technica](#) notes that late last year, Google eliminated its free, unlimited photo storage service for anyone with a Gmail account. A competitor – Amazon Photos – might be exactly what you're looking for. Here's why.

Amazon Photos remains free if you've got an Amazon Prime account.



If you're storing photos for your personal use (not for a business), you get free unlimited storage for your high-resolution photos. There's a storage limit of 5 GB for video files.

Another plus is you can use Amazon Photos apps on both Mac and Windows as well as iOS and Android devices.

In addition, if you prefer, you can use the [Amazon Photos website](#) on any device using a web browser.

If you need more video storage, Amazon charges \$1.99/month

for 100 GB of storage, \$6.99/month for 1 TB, and \$11.99/month for 2 TB. There are even more storage options, maxing out at \$1,799.70/year for 30 TB of storage.

But wait – there's more.


You can also edit your photos using either the desktop app (macOS and Windows 10) or the Amazon Photos app for iOS, iPadOS and Android.

In addition, you can purchase prints, books, and photos suitable for hanging on your wall from Amazon Photos.

And you can create photo albums and share them with family and friends.

In fact, [reviewed.com](#) rates Amazon Photos as the "best value" for online photo printing services in 2021. It falls right below Shutterfly: its top-rated photo service.

[reviewed.com](#) writes about Amazon Photos, "Offerings are pretty basic, but the photo quality is respectable, the price is respectable, and prints can be mailed to you for free...if you're looking for standard sizes and good-looking prints at a decent price, Amazon is a good choice."



The Mac Amazon Photos installer copied 474 photos from my Apple's Photos app into the Amazon Photos cloud storage app. Since I installed the Amazon Photos app from the App Store onto my iPad, all of my photos are also accessible there. Amazon Photos offers free, unlimited cloud storage for personal use of high-quality photos. 5 GB of video storage is also free.

- Cell phone companies

And this is just the tip of the iceberg. The list is huge.

Imagine if there was a free resource to help protect you from becoming a victim...

All ages embrace tech – despite Internet woes in many places

This is the year to finally decide to do it. For years, you've thought about taking a CKCS class or workshop.

You've considered cracking open a book about your new iPhone or Windows 10 or Macintosh computer or iPad.


Maybe you've updated your Mac to the newest operating system, called Big Sur.

Or you've thought for some time about learning those Windows 10 features you never seem to use.

It turns out that many of your counterparts are taking time to learn about technology and embracing it.

A **Pew Research poll** done in the fall of 2019 reveals tech adoption among Gen Xers (people born between 1965 and 1979) and Baby Boomers (people born between 1946 and 1964) has grown considerably.

Members of the Silent Generation (people born between 1925 and 1945) have also embraced technology. The Pew Research poll revealed those in the Silent Generation and Boomers have increased their use of Facebook by double digits since 2015.



The Internet is one option that's driving tech usage among all age groups. Pew Research discovered that in a 2019 poll.

Fall 2019 Pew Research poll results

- **Nearly all Millennials (almost 100%) (people born between 1980 and late 1990s) say they use the Internet (19% of them use only smartphones to access the Internet – no tablet such as the iPad or PC or Mac computer)**
- **91% of Gen Xers use the Net (55% own tablets)**
- **85% of Boomers use the Internet (52% own tablets)**

- **Well over half – 62% – of the Silent Generation uses the Internet (33% own tablets)**

WHAT GENERATION ARE YOU?

One factor limiting technology adoption by all ages is lack of access to Internet service. A surprising number of us just can't connect.

Who has broadband? Plenty of Americans still don't have access to always-on, high-speed Internet service. A 2019 **C|net article** reported that 19 million of us still have no access to broadband, despite the fact that many consider it as necessary as water and electricity (especially during the Coronavirus pandemic).

I've taught Mac and iPad classes to students at CKCS who rely on expensive and slow satellite Internet because there is no Internet provided by cable TV companies or fiber-optic service where they live. The FCC reports 40% of folks living in rural America have no broadband mainly because of the cost, installation, and upkeep.



C|net reports, "Building networks in rural America is incredibly expensive, and in some places it's nearly impossible due to tough terrain or inclement weather. But the biggest barrier is low population density in rural areas. Broadband providers simply won't offer service if they can't get enough customers to pay for it." So there are millions of potential Internet users in the U.S. who have no access.

If somehow affordable, fast, always-on Internet service could become a reality in rural America, many of those folks could embrace technology just as their counterparts in cities do.

Apple: Don't wait. Update your iPhone, iPad, & iPod now.

If you haven't yet updated to the latest version of your iPad, iPhone or iPod's operating system – you should do it now.

News reports indicate the popularity of Apple's mobile devices have made them even more of a target during the Coronavirus pandemic as more of us work from home and from a motel room.

Some folks with lousy home Internet service have been working out of a motel room where there's high-speed broadband and fewer distractions than in their homes.

In fact, Apple admits the security flaws may have been actively exploited. That means you should update as soon as you can.

Apple has gotten high marks for the security of its devices. That's why the urgent nature of the message from the company telling iPhone, iPad, and iPod touch users to upgrade is telling.

A security researcher who remains anonymous first reported the exploited security flaws, one of which, involves the Safari browser. That's the most-used browser on Apple's iPad, iPhone and iPod touch.

Forbes reports, "Many people like to wait for awhile to update their iPhones to new iOS versions, to avoid any bugs, or maybe they are simply too busy. Sometimes this is ok, but with iOS 14.4 (and iPadOS 14.4), it's important to update as soon as you can." The article goes on to say "If something's been exploited, it means attackers are already successfully using it to attack Apple users."

Here's how the latest update appeared on my iPad as I was about ready to download and install.

A website called screenrant writes, "Apple's latest iOS 14.4 security updates are among the most important to be released for the iPhone and should be downloaded and installed immediately. iPadOS has also received the same security fixes in iPadOS 14.4. The new version of the operating system corrects three actively exploited security issues. As a result, it is worth every iPhone and iPad owner checking if an update is available and installing it right away to avoid potential unauthorized access to their devices. Apple's iPhone and iPad are typically considered very secure but, as with most mobile devices, breaches can arise from time to time."

Enough said.

An application security expert at Immersive Labs is advising people to update "with a sense of urgency," according to the Forbes report.

Windows 10 PC sales shine during pandemic

Back in November of last year, we told you that iPad sales were soaring during the pandemic. As of mid-summer 2020, iPad sales soared by 31%. *The New York Times* even headlined a news item, “Why Apple’s iPad is the gadget of the Pandemic.”

Mac computer sales were nothing to sniff at either. Apple reported last August that Mac laptop sales climbed by 21% over the year before. Mac desktops (such as the Mac mini and iMac) were also selling well.

Now we learn that sales of Windows PCs increased nearly 11% in the last quarter of 2020. This is a dramatic climb from the start of 2020 when PC sales dropped by 12%.

Business Insider reports that Microsoft traditionally has served business customers (many are large corporations.) But as the pandemic took its toll, more and more of us are working from home. “While corporate customers didn’t go away, much of the demand for things like laptops and productivity software (think Microsoft Office) were driven by consumers stuck at home.

You may remember back in August, many news sites reported a nationwide laptop shortage as millions of school kids got on board the Zoom train and learned virtually.

The upsurge in PC sales were covered by the media with an interesting series of headlines:

Pandemic rebound? PC shipments post biggest upswing in a decade writes Gregg Kelzer of Computerworld.

MarketWatch reports, *HP shares jump 9% on record PC sales.*

The PC is suddenly cool again...for now, reports CNBC.

Pandemic-driven sales boost an entire inventory of products

Windows and Mac computers, along with iPads, aren’t the only items selling very well since March 2020. A whole variety of goods has grown in popularity since the awful pandemic of 2020 struck:

- **Smart speaker sales** have spiked since owners are buying multiple devices (PCMag reports 35% of U.S. households owned a smart speaker at the end of 2019.)
- **Guitar sales** have soared. Fender, a major guitar maker reports their sales climbed 17% during the pandemic, reports CNBC.
- **Hitting the road** during pandemic: RV sales soaring, reports Boston’s ABC-TV affiliate in Yahoo! News.
- **Logitech and Kensington** – makers of computer keyboards, trackballs, and mice – report strong sales. In addition, webcams used for Zoom, FaceTime and Skype video sessions are selling extremely well.
- **Water filters are hot.** Pur, Brita, and Zerowater became even more popular in 2020 after many stores ran out of bottled water.
- **Sewing machines** are growing in popularity. It’s become a quarantine hobby for some – while many are using the machines to make their own masks.
- **Air purifier** sales are red hot because of the Coronavirus. Because more people are working from home, they’re demanding healthier inside air. In addition, more air purifiers are going in dental offices, schools and government buildings. Austin Air, which builds air purifiers in its Buffalo, N.Y. headquarters, is even limiting its sales to two air purifier colors and hired more workers because of unheard of demand.
- **Yeast** is selling well since baking has become a popular pastime of the pandemic. (Can you say “bake bread?”)
- **Spending on pet care**, pet adoptions and pet fostering has risen. Adoption rates at shelters and humane societies have climbed 15%. At the same time, donations are badly needed as humane societies have seen a major hike in demand for spaying and neutering. In addition, many humane societies are only allowing serious adopters into their facilities because of COVID-19. Folks interested in adopting dogs or cats must be pre-approved for adoption.

Crack open a tech tool – plenty of options are available

If you own an Apple device or a Mac, you definitely need to check out [Take Control Books](#).

They are well-written, they're *chockfull* of easy-to-understand tech help, and they won't break your wallet. In addition, updates are free, and each book is updated with new information on a regular basis.

You can't check out Take Control Books at your local library. Instead, you download them to your computer or mobile device.

They come in three different formats, and I normally choose the PDF option. You can also copy the book to a different device.

Made in America, Canada, England, New Zealand, or India?

Okay. Inventions, discoveries, and new innovations are occurring all over the world – not just in America.

Americans sometimes get blindsided because this country is so large – it has a huge population made up of many different individuals.

But some of our best loved products, devices, and innovations were invented – elsewhere.

In fact, many products that Americans hold near and dear were invented in Canada or Great Britain or India or New Zealand or...

You get the point. For example, Colin Murdoch of New Zealand invented the disposable syringe. (Because of COVID-19 vaccines, syringes have been in the news now more than ever.)

Another New Zealander, A.J. Hackett, is responsible for the commercial bungee jumping craze.

If you connect to the Internet (or TV) by MetroNet, you're using ultra-fast fiber-optic technology. Dr. Narinder Singh Kapany (of India) is known worldwide as the "Father of Fibre-Optics" because of his pioneering work.

Closer to home, the trackball (which I use every day on my Mac mini) was not invented by Americans. It was created by Canadians and used by the Royal Canadian Navy's DATAR system as early as 1952. (Thank you!)

Do you use canola oil to cook? Thank the Canadians. It was created at the University of Manitoba in the early 1970s.

Other Canadian firsts include computerized Braille for the blind and the first 56k modem

(Remember when your phone line was tied up as you "surfed" the web or used AOL?)

The next time you board an aircraft, thank the Canadians. The very first commercial jet to take to the sky in North America was designed by a man named James C. Floyd. He is a Canadian aerospace engineer born in 1914 in Great Britain.

Here's an item that might not surprise you. The snowblower is an innovation straight from Canada. In 1927, Arthur Sicard made the first one. Many Americans living in the Dakotas, Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio, New York, Maine, and many other states wouldn't be without their trusty snowblowers.

The British have a long history of innovations. What has been called "one of the most remarkable medical breakthroughs in the 20th century" occurred in 1978. You may remember that Louise Joy Brown is the first human to have been born after being conceived through an IVF (in vitro fertilization) experiment.

In 1984, DNA profiling was discovered at the University of Leicester by Sir Alec Jeffreys. That same year, a pioneering computer game called Elite was created by David Braben and Ian Bell. Elite was ahead of its time. It was one of the very first computer games to use 3-D graphics.

Five years later, a man developed a proposal for a unique system of pages with links on them. The man, Sir Tim Berners-Lee, developed the plan for a new effort called the World Wide Web. He then went on to create HTML (the language of the web) and HTTP, the system used every time you open a Web browser. (Thank you!)

Just how good is Microsoft Defender at protecting Windows 10 computers?

The answer might surprise you. You've known for decades that you should not connect a Windows computer to the Internet without running security software. That's a no-brainer.

So getting back to the original question:

How does Microsoft's built-in Windows security software stack up against third-party security apps? According to recent tests by the security experts at AV-Test, it does pretty well.

Cyn Mackley covers the topic in her daily Tech Tips journal. Let's look at the results from her latest testing.

Tech Tips evaluated 22 antivirus programs. Testers used each program's default settings and compared them using three standards:

- **Protection:** Simply put, how well does the program defend against malware and viruses?
- **Performance:** How much of the PC's resources are required to use the program? Did it slow down the computer?
- **Usability:** How does the software impact the ease of use of the computer? This includes false virus warnings and blocking the use of legitimate programs.

Top Scores: Windows Defender received top scores of 6 across the board and was ranked as the top product. The software detected 100% of

the malware and viruses and showed no instances of blocking legitimate software.

The good news is that most of the antivirus software tested did a pretty good job.

Windows Defender outperformed Bitdefender, AVG, Malwarebytes, and three other antiviruses.

Trend Micro, Vipre, Norton, Kaspersky, McAfee, and six other antivirus programs all got perfect scores. The only security software with any real issues was Smart Antivirus 2.0, which only got a 2.5 out of 6 for Protection. PC Matic received only a 4.

What are you looking at?

A few weeks ago, I was visiting the [L.A. Times website](#) when I stumbled upon an interesting article headlined, [The 8 TV shows that got us through 2020](#).

Why would this interest me when I almost never watch TV anymore? (Okay, Wildcat basketball will still move me to switch on the ancient flat screen.)

It turns out that the *Los Angeles Times* staff picks include mainly streaming programs. You know. Shows that are available via a streaming service such as Netflix, Bravo, Peacock, Acorn TV, HBO and HBO Max, CBS All Access, Apple TV+...)

Streaming service use by Americans during this awful pandemic has exploded. To stream, you have to have high-speed broadband Internet. And Akamai Technologies has been tracking our Internet usage. In early 2020 when the COVID-19 pandemic first struck the States, our Internet use in the U.S. grew considerably:

Akamai's senior manager for media product marketing told [TVTechnology.com](#), "Traffic increased 30% between the end of February and end of March, ten times greater than the normal month-to-month growth rate that we normally see. To put that into perspective, we saw roughly a year's worth of growth in a month's time frame."

People are binge-watching programs they've never seen before. Whether it's new episodes of *Doc Martin*, *The Brokenwood Mysteries*, *Mrs. America*, *Below Deck: Mediterranean*, *What We Do in the Shadows* or *Little America*, streamers are watching a lot of programming. You get the picture. Regular readers of this newsletter will know that I have streamed Acorn TV for years.

That's why I smiled when I saw that the British TV show, *Lovejoy*, made the *L.A. Times* list.

I had spotted it in Acorn TV's program lineup, but never sampled it.

Now I'm binge-watching it – I'm up to season 4 (the Brits call it series 4.) The show is based on books by author John Grant (who uses the pen name Jonathan Gash.)




Let's Talk about Watermarking





- Spring begins on Saturday, March 20, at 5:37 A.M. (EDT). Think of the birds singing, sunshine returning, trees and flowers blooming...



By the way, this awesome city-building software is a product of Canada — Codebrew Games is based in Toronto. The developer made sure the game is available on the various platforms. I admire that.
