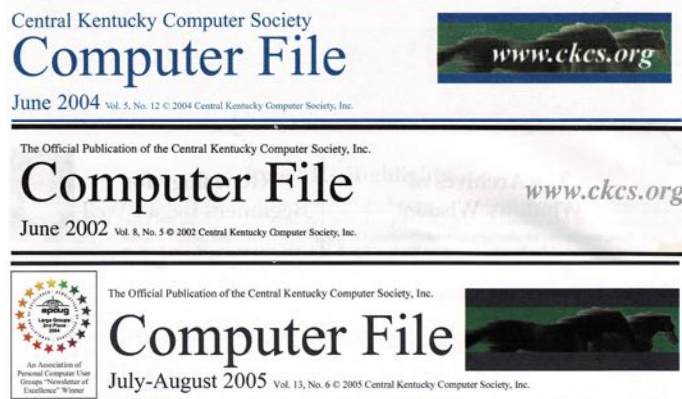
A graphic in June 2004 promoting the upcoming CKCS election and picnic.

This CKCS class schedule from fall 2004 demonstrates the variety of classes taught 20 years ago. Back then, classes revolved around operating systems for Windows and Macintosh, along with apps you could run on those machines.

While those computers are still very important two decades later, CKCS has expanded its course offerings to include a variety of mobile devices including iPhones, iPads, and Apple Watches.

In 2004, CKCS offered nightly courses from 7–9 P.M. so students who worked during the day could learn at night.

Referred to as the “best bargain in the Bluegrass,” the class descriptions for the fall 2004 courses at CKCS described a variety of titles ranging from ‘Beginning Digital Imaging’ to entry Windows lessons in ‘Computer Basics’ to ‘Intro to Mac OS X (Jaguar),’ before Apple re-named its operating system macOS.

CKCS classes are an excellent value. Classes cost \$35 for six sessions, after a \$40 annual enrollment fee. If you're 50 or up, the enrollment fee includes SeniorNet Magazine and other benefits. Current SeniorNet members are considered to have paid the enrollment fee.

Computer Basics • Louis Dawson • Harold Washburn

Get a good start! If you can't do the following – or don't know why you should – take Basics and get the computer working for you! Learn how to: Use several windows at once • Copy & Paste • Save • Save As • Make a shortcut • Copy to and from C and a floppy disk.

Beginning Digital Imaging • Ilse Newbery • Joe Dietz

In this course, learn how to create images with a digital camera and scanners. Learn enhancement techniques. Learn to print and share your images. We use Paint Shop Pro, version 8.1 but once you understand the process of enhancing and image handling, you can translate skills to another package such as Photoshop Elements 2.0.

Family Tree Maker • Maggie Windstandley

Family Tree Maker helps organize your family history. In this class you will enter names, information, and photos. You'll learn to print family trees, genealogy reports, and scrapbooks. We'll explore related web sites. You can save your information to disk and take it with you.

Intro to Mac OS X (Jaguar) • K. Jefferson

We'll show you what you need to know to effectively use your Mac. Files, folders, the Trash Can, Copying Files, the Finder, the Dock and File Management are taught in this class. If you've recently switched to a Mac or been using a Mac for a long time, but just upgraded to OS X, this is the class you want to take.

Mac Maintenance • Kurt Jefferson

What should you do to protect your data and keep your Mac in tip-top shape? We'll show you how to keep OS X (Jaguar) running smoothly. We'll also demonstrate backing up your data, burning CDs, the new Flash and Thumb drives, and more.

Microsoft Access • Peggy Prentice

The database program Access is used in many businesses today. Start at the beginning to learn Access or attend to enhance your knowledge. This class will be taught by Peggy Prentice, with Ann Riestler.

Microsoft Excel • Bob Kiser

This class teaches how to create and maintain a spreadsheet and how to use formulas. Basic reporting will be taught. Bob Kiser and Larry Parker bring business experience to this class.

Desktop Publishing • Lou Cerwin

Make professional-looking publications with Microsoft Publisher's pre-designed layouts, or create your own custom look. Lou Cerwin will help you master some of the higher-level functions that Microsoft Publisher makes possible.

Microsoft Word • Larry Parker

Microsoft Word is one of the most popular word-processing packages in use, and word-processing knowledge is essential in the job market. To learn more for home or office, Word class is a plus.

Microsoft Works • Harold Washburn

Intermediate computing will take you to the next step with hands-on instruction using Microsoft Works. There will be more detailed instruction on word processing, spreadsheets and databases, and a bit more file management and Internet with e-mail instructions.

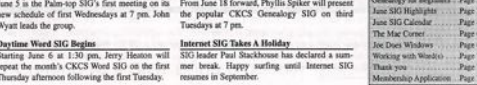
Director Candidates—One-Year Terms

Goodbye XP—Hello Vista!

The Windows XP/Vista Special Interest Group will have an in-depth demonstration of the new Microsoft operating system Windows Vista Premium on Tuesday, March 13, at 7 p.m. Here's a list of what you can expect:

Two words: Fun. Fun. Like a new car, Vista practically begs you to play with all its shiny new gadgets, see how hard you can drive it, enjoy the novelty of the experience.

Microsoft had 2500 Certified Vista Testers and 5 million Beta Testers working months on this new operating system. There will be a slight learning curve, but I love the new system. I bought Vista books and Vista CD tutorials to help me along. Please don't miss this opportunity to be great fun and a learning experience.

1. Sidebar: This is brand new, a vertical bar on the right side of your computer screen, on my sidebar I have a Clock, Calendar, Weather, Slide Show, and Notes.

2. Thumbnail: Brand New. When you put your cursor on a program or document in the Taskbar, it will show you a thumbnail (a small photo) of the item.

3. Alt + Tab shows you all the programs you have open by thumbnail. Hold the Alt key down and hit the Tab key each time, it will highlight each in turn.

4. 3D Flip: Windows Key + Tab shows you all the programs you have open by thumbnail. Hold the Alt key down and hit the Tab key each time, it will highlight each in turn.

have open big time in the middle of your screen like a deck of cards.

Hold the Windows key down and hit the tab key to go thru them one at a time. This is part of Windows Aero. It gives you a new look and new ways to preview and switch between programs and other windows.

5. Search Boxes are everywhere in each program, file, Start Menu, etc. They are faster and respond with each letter you type in.

6. It has a new Welcome Center to help you personalize your Desktop.

7. Navigation Pane: Every folder window has a Navigation Pane which appears on the left side of the Windows. It gives you access to almost any file or folder on your computer.

8. Windows Media Center: With the proper peripherals, you can watch and record television, play music, view pictures, play games, etc. It gives you the tools to organize, view and share all the digital media on your computer. With a burner you can burn a CD and DVD and play it on your computer or television.

9. Windows Photo Gallery: Here we are getting to Auto Tags, this is a new option that lets you organize and identify photos in a new way.

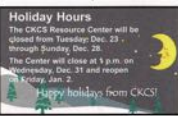

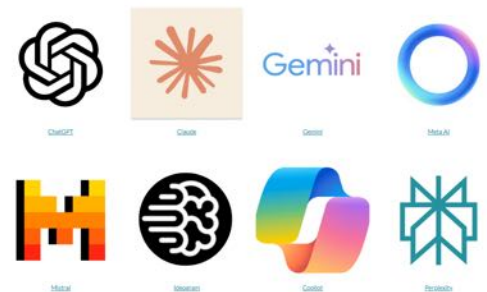
Interacting with AI (artificial intelligence) was such a pop-up event in August conducted by Trey Conatser, PhD, from the University of Kentucky.

The workshop was a great success, with everyone actively participating and gaining practical skills in AI interaction.



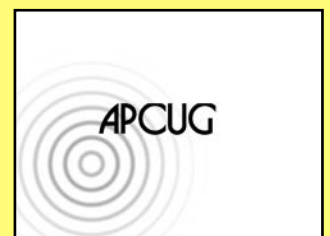

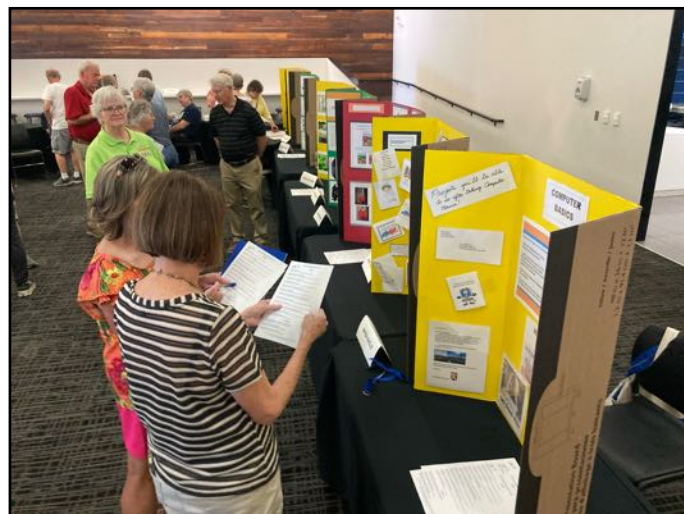

Is That a Robin or a Grackle Call?

Merlin recognized a Carolina Wren, Tufted Titmouse, and House Finch one August morning in a park near my home.

While at the OLLI Open House in August, I mentioned that I wasn't happy with the birding app that I installed on my iPhone. Both Joe Dietz and Karen Higdon recommended **Merlin**, a free app from Cornell University.

Now when I hear a bird call, I simply point my phone toward the sound, activate the Merlin recording, and within seconds a photo of the singing bird appears on the screen. It couldn't be easier.

The Cornell Lab of Ornithology uses eBird, one of the world's largest "science projects, with more 100 million bird sightings contributed annually by eBirders around the world," according to the **eBird website**. EBird is used to identify birds from its giant database and then

Merlin matches a bird type to its call. Merlin allows you to create a digital scrapbook of all the birds you've recorded so you can start creating a database for all of the birds found in your neighborhood.

Merlin requires an iPhone or iPad running iOS 16 or iPadOS 16 and later or a Macintosh computer with an M1 or M2 processor. Merlin requires an Android device running on Android 6 or later.

Equine Photography: Kathy Davis will be diving into how to improve our photos by using different composition techniques. The first session will be on what to look for in the viewfinder when framing up your shot. She will also go into the “rules” of a good image. The second session will be at Keeneland at the prestigious Yearling Sale, where you can practice these techniques on live year-old colts and fillies. The third session will be show and tell in class.

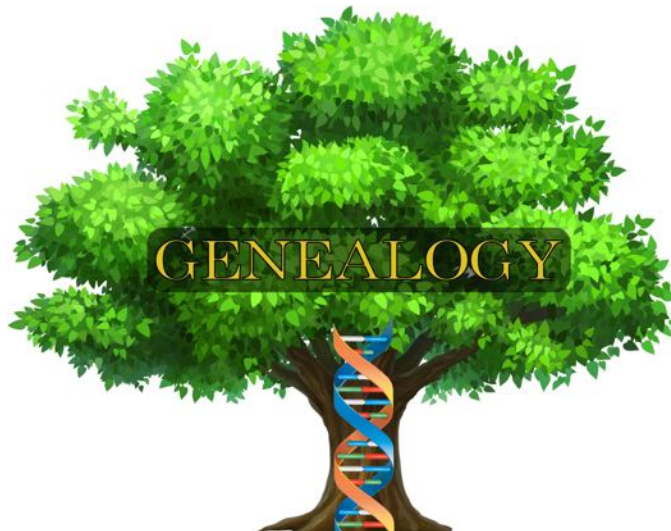

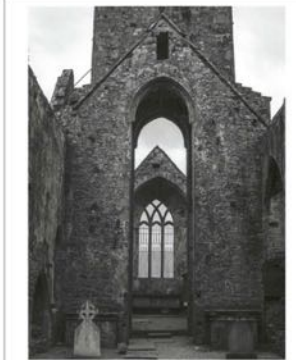

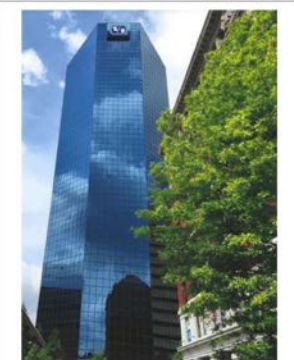

Billions of PERSONAL RECORDS LEAKED

Data Breach

Remember the name *National Public Data*. That company collects and then sells personal data to be used in background checks. It turns out that 2.7 billion records from National Public Data containing names, social security numbers, all known physical addresses and more, may have been stolen. **Those details were leaked on a hacker forum.** Multiple reports indicate that if you live in the U.S., U.K., or Canada, there's a good chance some of your personal information has been leaked. Several class action lawsuits have been filed against Jerico Pictures, thought to be doing business as National Public Data, for failing to protect the personal data of billions.

Proton VPN Makes Browser Extension Free

A Swiss-based virtual private network (VPN) with a good reputation, Proton VPN, is now **offering its browser extension free** for users of Firefox, Brave, Chrome, Edge, Waterfox, and other web browsers using the Chromium engine. Proton VPN's free users no longer need to download the company's app. VPNs are used to secure an Internet connection from prying eyes. In addition, residents living in countries run by dictators and authoritarian leaders often turn to VPNs so they can view websites and use apps blocked by those leaders. TechRadar notes that China, Iran, Russia, and Turkmenistan are a few of the nations preventing Internet users from downloading VPN apps from various app stores.

The Smallest Mac Ever—Coming Soon?

By the time you read this, Apple may have released its smallest Mac ever—a new M4 Mac mini—the size of an Apple TV, according to reports. The M4 refers to Apple's newest processor, powering its iPad Pro, and possibly coming soon to the Mac mini, iMac and the MacBook Pro laptop.

Bloomberg's *Power On* newsletter reports those details by Mark Gurman, who has a good track record of detailing Apple products before they're released. **Laptopmag** reports we should anticipate three M4 Mac mini and iMac models: the iMac M4, Mac mini M4, and Mac Mini M4 Pro. **MacRumors** notes this will be the first new Mac mini design since 2010, and it will be much smaller, "making it Apple's smallest ever desktop computer."

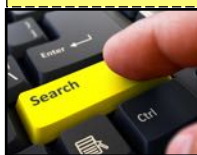
NEW SAFARI BROWSER TO OFFER 'DISTRACTION CONTROL'



If ads, browser cookies, or other items are causing you grief, Apple has come up with a new Safari feature called Distraction Control to tackle those issues. It will be available in upcoming versions of iOS18, iPadOS 18 and macOS Sequoia (macOS 15). **PCMag** notes the user will be able to dismiss pop-ups, videos, and other unwanted items by either tapping or clicking portions

of their Safari screen once the feature has been turned on.

Ruling: Google Is a Monopoly



"Google Violates Section 2 of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act," wrote Judge Amit Mehta **according to reports** in August. Because Google paid partners to make its search engine the default on smart-phones and mobile browsers, a federal judge ruled it created an illegal monopoly. Google plans on appealing the ruling, according to reports. **The Verge** notes that the DuckDuckGo CEO praised the decision but said the fight was not over. DuckDuckGo testified against Google.

No, THESE ARE NOT REAL BANK EMPLOYEES

Here's a new twist on credit card fraud. The **FBI** notes that fraudsters are phoning people and urging them to cut up their bank cards.



That's right. Imposters are urging victims to take a scissor to their bank cards while leaving the chip inside intact. The fraudsters quiz the victim about recent transactions, leading the individual to believe there is fraudulent activity involving their account. An accomplice then picks up the credit card remains, including the chip, from the

victim's home. Another method involves texting a victim using a message that contains a very good fake image—with an excellent copy of the bank's logo—urging a person to cut up his cards for someone to pick up the remains.

THE CABLE TV EXODUS IS NOW AN EPIDEMIC



If you're getting more and more promotions from cable/satellite TV companies trying to woo you, it's because customers have been leaving in droves for decades. **A website called Comparitech** notes "major cable providers collectively lost six million pay-TV subscribers each year

between 2019 and 2022." Cutting the cable TV cord has now become an epidemic. So where exactly are cord-cutters going? Most folks canceling cable TV are opting for live-streaming services such as Sling TV, YouTube TV, fubo, and Hulu+Live TV, reports Comparitech. One of the sole reasons people are quitting cable is because of cost. The average monthly cable TV bill has reached \$118 and the worst year for the cable exodus was 2009 (partially because of the housing market crash.) What streamers call on-demand, meaning you can watch when you want and the content is not necessarily live, is also replacing cable. Netflix is by far the largest streamer. Comparitech reports that most Americans now pay for more than one streaming option with 88 percent of the population subscribing to at least one service. No doubt that will climb even more in the days ahead.

Before you scan any QR code, make sure you know where it comes from and which websites it will take you to. QRs from bad actors can lead you to dangerous websites with malicious software that may try to get access to your private information.

When Is Too Much Caffeine Dangerous?

A new **study** shows if you drink more than four cups of brewed coffee, ten cans of soda, or two energy drinks in a single day, you might not be doing your health any favors. The **research** by Zydus Medical College in India tracked 92 men and women between 18 and 45 years old. Nearly 20% of those studied were considered to be chronic caffeine users.



The study showed participants consuming more than 400 mg of caffeine every day (the amount in the drinks listed above) experienced *higher than normal* heart rates and elevated blood pressure. “Researchers said the highest daily caffeine intakes were observed in participants who were female, employed in business and management roles, and living in urban areas,” noted the study.

Study: These Foods Lower Dementia Risk Even If You Have Type 2 Diabetes or Heart Disease

Turns out mom was right. Eating your veggies, along with fruits and whole grains, instead of red meat lowers the dementia risk by 31%, according to a **study** of more than 80,000

older adults listed in the UK Biobank. (The Biobank is a database used for research containing a half million participants and is the largest of its kind.) Researchers say the study cannot prove cause and effect but the findings underscore previous work showing a link between brain health and an anti-inflammatory diet of whole grains, fruits and vegetables.

This Sweetener Could Cause Clots

There is **new evidence** from the **Cleveland Clinic** that the popular artificial sweetener, erythritol, may increase the risk of blood clots. A small group of men and women with an average age of 30, and no history of heart disease, took part in the study. Half of the group of 20 adults drank water mixed with 30 grams of sugar while the other half drank water mixed with 30 grams of erythritol. The latter group had a greater chance for blood clots because of blood platelet activation. Researchers say erythritol needs to be studied further.



Ways to Increase Your HDL

When it comes to cholesterol, you want your HDL high and LDL low. HDL is considered “good” cholesterol, while LDL is less desirable. Doctors say you want to keep your LDL under 100 (mg per deciliter) if possible. You want to keep your HDL between 40 and 59 (mg per deciliter). Your diet, exercise, family history, and other factors play a role in your cholesterol levels. So how can you boost your HDL? Experts say increase your exercise, don’t eat trans fats (often found in cakes, cookies, and other products made with shortening), limit saturated fats (found in meats and full-dairy products), quit smoking, and ask your doctor about possibly taking medicine to raise your HDL. You can read more from a **2019 task force report** from the American College of Cardiology (ACC) and the American Heart Association (AHA).

Is Supermarket Baby Food Healthy?

Study Says Vast Majority of Products Are Not



Research published in the journal *Nutrients* reveals that the vast majority of baby foods found on grocery store shelves fail to meet nutritional guidelines

set by the World Health Organization (WHO). 70% fail to meet protein recommendations, 25% contain added or hidden sweeteners, and one in five of the food products for babies and toddlers had salt levels above what the WHO recommends. The study shows that sales of baby food pouches had skyrocketed and most have sugar levels that are much too high. One option to find better baby food is through an app called **Food-Switch**, developed in Australia, allowing the user to determine the nutritional value of baby food by using his or her Phone or Android phone. The user scans a bar code on the product and the app provides a nutritional profile of the baby food.

Shingles Connection to Brain Health

Studies show nearly all American adults 50 and over have been infected with the virus that causes both shingles and chicken pox. Shingles usually causes a rash that’s painful. But the virus might have an more profound impact on the brain. **New research** now shows there’s about a 20% higher risk of memory loss leading to dementia for those who’ve had a shingles outbreak. One of the study’s authors points out to *The Harvard Gazette* that the shingles vaccine “can help reduce the risk of adverse health outcomes from shingles...”

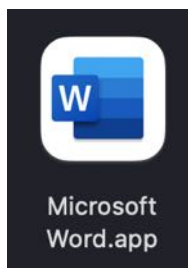

Outlook, PowerPoint, OneNote, and more Microsoft apps contain a vulnerability that could be exploited by hackers. After the vulnerabilities were reported, Microsoft updated MS Teams and OneNote, but Word, Excel, Outlook, and PowerPoint still had

the issue as of late August. At that time, Microsoft was still working on updates for the other apps. Cisco Talos concludes that macOS could also make users answer an on-screen prompt whereby users would decide whether or not a third party plug-in is loaded into the system in addition to the security systems already employed.

Apple is apparently considering changing “Apple ID” to “Apple Account,” according to reports in **MacRumors**. The site reports the change may come later this year with the release of iOS18 and macOS 15. Apple ID is used across all of Apple’s platforms to buy apps, music, sync files using iCloud, email, and other uses. Apple has used Apple ID for more than ten years.

Ars Technica: Your TV is a Selling Machine

“Automatic content recognition (ACR) tech is at the heart of the smart TV business,” writes the tech website **Ars Technica**. The site notes that TV makers generate a huge amount of money through ads appearing on smart TV sets.

More and more TVs are displaying ads on the operating system’s home screen, in the screen-saver, and by providing ad-supporting streaming channels. Some TV makers are tracking viewers



to see which ads they’re seeing on the ad-supported streaming channels. An upstart, called Telly, which provides free TVs, contains a secondary screen to display ads even when the TV is off. “Telly takes tracking to a new level, especially since owners can’t opt out—blocking tracking may result in an owner being charged for the TV,” writes **Ars Technica**.

CrowdStrike Disruption May Spark Change

PCMag asks the question, “To prevent another CrowdStrike-like outage, will Windows become a more closed operating system like Apple’s macOS?” The



CrowdStrike software update caused Windows devices—8.5 million—in airports, schools, and businesses to stop working. The disruption was so widespread—from airline reservation systems to business assembly lines—that, PC Mag reports, Microsoft is “pushing for a clampdown on third-party access to the Windows kernel, a deep layer of the OS that manages a PC’s hardware and software resources.” A Microsoft vice president wrote in a blog that the incident shows Microsoft must make change and innovation a priority in the area of “end-to-end resilience.”

What’s the Release Date for iOS, iPadOS Along With Mac Sequoia Updates?

September may be the month when Apple delivers new versions of its operating systems for the iPhone and iPad. The new macOS Sequoia might also be coming in September or possibly be delivered a bit later in the year. **9to5 Mac** reports the company is planning a Sept. 10 date for its fall Apple event. The site **reported** in late August that Apple was planning on releasing new operating systems for its mobile devices and Macs in September.

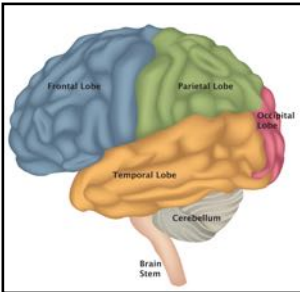
David Packard co-founded the Hewlett-Packard Company with Bill Hewlett. The electrical engineer was born on Sept. 7, 1912, in Pueblo, Colo. In 1939, Packard and Hewlett formed what today is commonly called HP in Packard's garage with an initial investment of \$538. The name of the company, Hewlett-Packard, rather than Packard-Hewlett, was decided by a coin flip according to Packard's book, *The HP Way*. Today, the HP Garage is a private museum in Palo Alto, Calif., considered the "Birthplace of Silicon Valley." HP eventually became the largest producer of electronic testing and measuring devices. It is also well-known for its calculators, printers, and computers.



***William Wrigley, Jr.** built the biggest chewing gum operation in the world. Wrigley sold Americans on the idea that chewing gum was not rude, but instead, a healthy habit. Courtesy: Wikipedia*

William Wrigley, Jr. was born in Philadelphia but discovered his true calling in Chicago. He went into business for himself selling soap. He provided customers premiums of baking powder as an incentive to buy his soap.

He discovered the baking powder was more popular and started selling it. Wrigley provided customers two packs of chewing gum for every tin of baking powder they bought. He soon learned the chewing gum was more popular than the baking powder. So his company started producing and selling chewing gum, which was a huge hit. His company eventually became the largest chewing gum maker in the world. He was born on Sept. 30, 1861.



Born on Sept. 8, 1903, **Marthe Vogt** was a renowned German neuroscientist (studies the nervous system, including the brain, spinal column, and nerves) who moved to England with the rise of Nazism in Germany. In 1954, Vogt wrote a groundbreaking paper on how neurotransmitters work in the brain. She is considered to be one of the leading neuroscientists of the 20th century. *The Lancet* describes her as "brilliant" and writes that her research

opened the door for the treatment of mental illness. Vogt moved to California in her later years to be close to her sister. She died one day after her 100th birthday in Sept. 2003.



***Elliott Coues** wrote the first book of its type in 1872 to identify birds and classify them according to their characteristics. Courtesy: Wikipedia*

Elliott Coues wrote the "bible" on identifying North American birds in 1872. His *Key to North American Birds* was the first publication of its type to classify birds according to a key in the book. The publication helped many budding birdwatchers discover, research, and learn about birds in North America. Coues was also an army

surgeon, a leader in surveying Arizona territory, and secretary of the U.S. Geological and Geographical Survey of the Territories. Historians say Coues had the ability to discuss technical terms and write details about birds so anyone could understand him. He was born on Sept. 9, 1842.

Melville Herskovits was an anthropologist who helped create the first African studies course at the university level. With the help of a \$30,000 grant from the Carnegie Foundation, Herskovits in 1948 began the first major program of African studies at an American university, at Northwestern. His Library of African Studies at Northwestern is the single largest library of African materials in the world, including 15,000 books in 300 different African languages. Herskovits and his wife, Frances, spent three months in Haiti in the 1930s, journaling about the people who lived there. They also completed work in Ghana, Brazil, Nigeria, Benin, and Trinidad. Herskovits was born on Sept. 10, 1895.

Alexander Langmuir is credited with saving thousands of lives while working at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and developing a program to train epidemiologists. Langmuir's efforts helped end the polio epidemic in the U.S. and alert the public on how infectious diseases spread. In 1951, he started the Epidemic Intelligence Service to teach physicians, veterinarians, and those collecting health statistics about the causes of diseases and ways to control them. He was born on Sept. 12, 1910.

Michael DeBakey was a pioneering surgeon known for a number of "firsts," including, in 1953, the first treatment for fatty, waxy build-up in the arteries, the first coronary artery bypass in 1964, and the first surgical implant of a machine to pump blood from the lower heart chambers to the rest of the body. In the early 1930s, DeBakey created what's called the "roller pump." It was a primary part of a heart-lung machine, allowing open-heart surgery. DeBakey received more than 50 honorary degrees. He was born on Sept. 7, 1908.

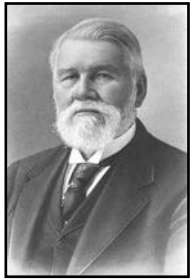

Milton Hershey founded the Hershey Chocolate Company in Pennsylvania after he became quite interested in chocolate candy after having visited the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago. Courtesy: Wikipedia

If you ask most Americans to name their favorite brand of chocolate, many, if not most, will answer: Hershey.

Milton Hershey was one of the most influential early proponents of chocolate candy in America. His early secret to the success of his Lancaster Caramel Company in Pennsylvania was using fresh milk when producing caramels. In 1900, he sold his company for \$1,000,000 and concentrated on finding the right formula for chocolate candy bars. In 1903, he started building in Hershey, Pa., what eventually would become the single largest chocolate-producing plant in the world. Hershey refused to advertise his products. Despite that, his Hershey Chocolate Corporation began producing some of the best-selling chocolate bars in America. He produced the first Hershey bar in 1900, the first Hershey Kisses in 1907, and the first Hershey Chocolate Bar with Almonds in 1908. Hershey was born on Sept. 13, 1857.



Richard Gatling was a life-long inventor known for a range of inventions including his Gatling gun to a steam plow to a device for breaking hemp. The Gatling gun was the first successful machine gun. Courtesy: Wikipedia

An invention by **Richard Gatling** called the Gatling gun is considered to be the first successful machine gun. It was a crank-operated, multi-barrel gun. Gatling invented the gun the same year the Civil War erupted. He was a life-long inventor, having helped his dad create a machine to thin cotton in the field and to sow cotton seeds. He also finished a course at Ohio Medical College after becoming interested in medicine after suffering smallpox. His other inventions included a steam plow and a hemp-breaking device. He was born on Sept. 12, 1818.



Michiyo Tsujimura was a biochemist who discovered the positive health impacts of drinking green tea. Because of her early work, many Americans discovered green tea and began drinking it. Courtesy: Wikipedia

Michiyo Tsujimura has been called the world's "green tea research pioneer." Tsujimura was the first woman in Japan to earn a doctoral degree in agriculture. Her research as a biochemist led to groundbreaking discoveries in 1929 about the nutritional components and health benefits of green tea. Through meticulous research, Tsujimura showed that vitamin C was indeed present in green tea. Her paper *On Vitamin C in Green Tea* increased the popularity of green tea in America at a time when many Americans were only aware of black tea. Today, green tea comprises 15% of all green tea consumed in the U.S., according to the Tea Association of the USA. She was born on Sept. 17, 1888.



Frank Lutz is considered by historians to be the leading U.S. entomologist in the first half of the 20th century. "The Field Book of Insects," which Lutz published in 1918, was not only popular among the reading public, it was also a hit in the classroom where teachers used it in a variety of courses. As a child, **Frank Lutz** was fascinated by watching a caterpillar shed its skin. That interest developed into a lifelong fascination with insects. Lutz became the leading entomologist in the first half of the 20th century and taught that insects were an integral part of the world around us. He's recognized as a pioneer who set up the first nature trail in the U.S. He published *The Field Book of Insects* in 1918. He noted in the forward that the book was designed for individuals but it was a hit in the classroom where many teachers were using it. He became the first curator of the Department of Entomology at the American Museum of Natural History in 1909. He was born on Sept. 15, 1879.



Harvey Fletcher was the inventor of the first electronic hearing aid and the "father of stereophonic sound." He created both while at Bell Telephone Labs, where he worked for 33 years. Fletcher also oversaw research into the first successful stereo recordings, live

transmission of stereo sound, and creation of the first vinyl recordings. Fletcher and his team provided the first public demonstration of stereo sound in New York City in 1934. He was born on Sept. 11, 1884.

Kurt Lewin is often called the "father of social psychology." Lewin was a pioneering psychologist, known for his field theory of behavior. He broke new ground by using scientific methods and experiments when studying social behavior. His approach was revolutionary at the time. Lewin was one of the first psychologists to suggest that a person's development was due to both nature and nurture. Lewin was born in Prussia on Sept. 9, 1890.

You've probably never heard

of aeronautical engineer **Charles Lawrance**, but his Wright Whirlwind airplane engines made it possible for Charles Lindburgh, Admiral Byrd in the Arctic, Amelia Earhart, and others to fly long distances that were not possible before. The air-cooled engines worked so well that the U.S. Army and Navy used them in their aircraft. Lawrance was born on Sept. 30, 1882.

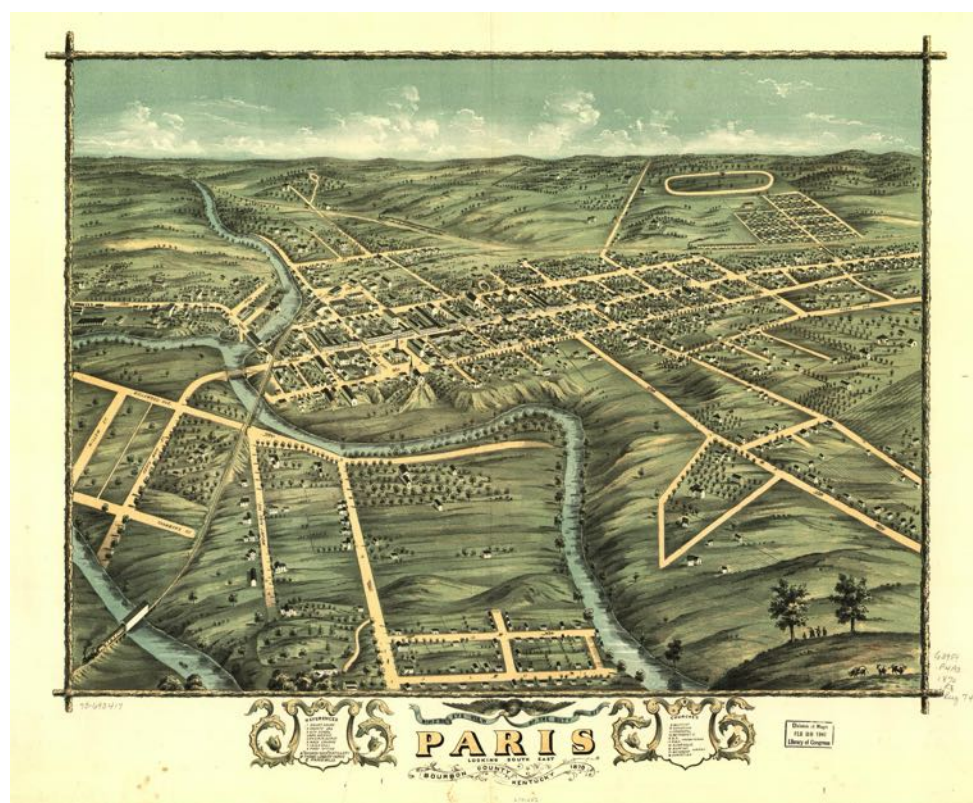

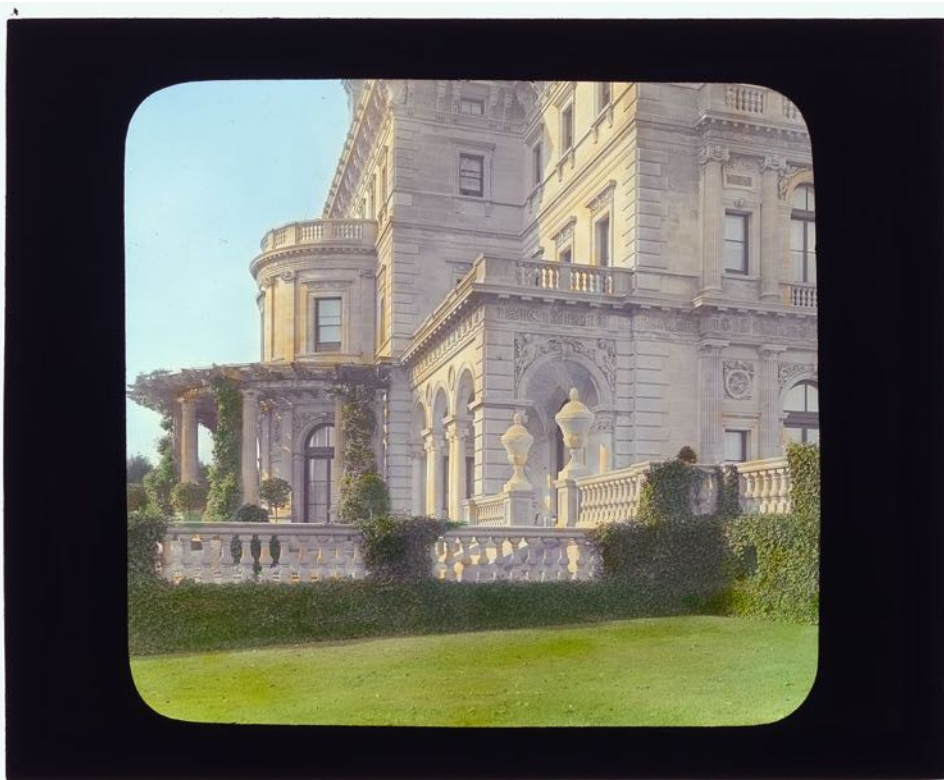

The Prairie School-style house designed by architect Frank Lloyd Wright was built for heiress Susan Lawrence Dana. The home reflects her and Wright's affection for organic architecture, the relatively flat landscape of central Illinois, and the Japanese aesthetic. This was the 72nd home that Wright designed. Charles Thomas, a medical publisher, was the second owner of the Springfield home from 1944 until his death in 1969.

American philanthropist Susan Lawrence Dana

Susan Lawrence Dana (1862–1946) was a Springfield, Ill., socialite and the wealthy owner of silver mines in Colorado and Oregon. After her father died, she took over the mines and a number of properties in central Illinois.

Her 12,000-square-foot home, known as the Dana-Thomas home in Springfield, had 35 separate rooms on 16 different levels. Lawrence Dana was committed to advancing social justice for women and African Americans. **SangamonLink** writes, “Susan was a woman’s rights activist for much of her life, starting with suffragist politics prior to Illinois women winning the right to vote in 1913; that included a period as president of the Springfield Equal Suffrage Club. In 1923, Susan was appointed legislative chairman of the Illinois branch of the National Woman’s Party, in which capacity she campaigned from her home to pass legislation in Illinois that granted equal rights to women. While Susan’s effort was mostly unsuccessful, it helped give women an early path to enter the larger political debates of their era.”

The home was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2008. Phillips served as the president of Phillips Petroleum from 1917 to 1939. 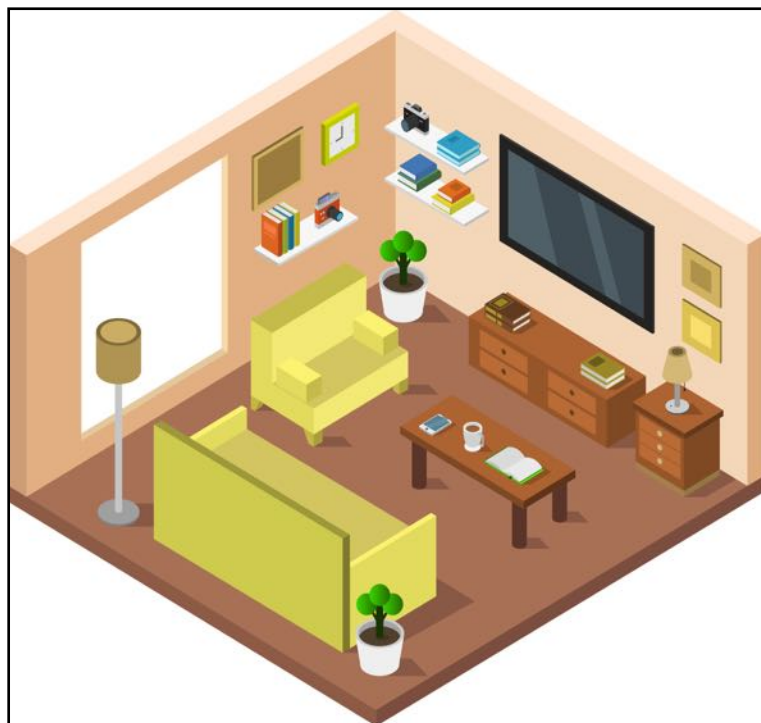
